BISHOP AND WIFE SEPARATED.

Announcement Causes a Sensation in Washington Society.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The sensation of the hour in Washington is the fact that Bishop Hurst, chancellor of the American University, one of the most prominent men in the Methodist church, has agreed to disagree with his wife.

Mrs. Hurst, with her 3 year-old son, left Washington a year ago, ostensibly to travel abroad and cultivate her fine voice at the European conservatories. To-day it is known that she has definitely decided not to return. She has taken apartments in Paris.

Mrs. Hurst has decided not to take any legal action in the matter.

Valuable Recipes.

PURÉE OF CORN.—Place the contents of one can of corn in a stewpan, add one pint of water, and allow to stew gently for three quarters of an hour. At the end of that time press through a sieve, add one and one half pints of milk, and return to the fire. When the milk reaches the boiling-point add one tablespoonful of butter and one of flour rubbed to a cream. Stir constantly until the mixture thickens, remove from the fire, season with salt and white pepper, and at the moment of serving stir in the beaten yolk of one egg.

SALMON CROQUETTES.—Chop one pound of cold boiled salmon into bits. Add to it one tablespoonful of chopped parsley, the juice of half a lemon, a pinch of Cayenne pepper, and one teaspoonful of salt. Melt one table-spoonful of butter in a saucepan and mix with it three table-spoonfuls of flour without allowing to brown. When smooth add one half pint of cream or rich milk and stir until the sauce is smooth and thick; then add it to the salmon, mix the whole thoroughly, and turn out on a platter to cool. When cold mold into shape, dip in beaten egg, then in rolled bread crumbs, and fry in deep fat, smoking hot. Serve garnished with parsley and sliced lemon, with sauce Hollandaise in a separate dish.

For the sauce rub half a cupful of butter to a cream and add the yolks of three eggs, one at a time. Stir in the juice of half a lemon, one fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, and a dash of Cayenne; then place the bowl containing the mixture over a pan of boiling water and add one cup of hot water to sauce, beating all the time, and stir constantly until it becomes as thick as boiled custard.
