TORONTO, July 15—(CP)—Industrial stocks received part of their early losses today, finishing the stock market's session 15 down while the golds took an index loss of 18 and base metal and western oil issues were narrowly higher at the close. Aggregate turnover of 85,000 shares was down 46,000 shares from the volume of the previous day.
 Interest lagged and there were no trading features. Sheep Rock continued fairly active, trading 16,000 shares on a gain of 6 to 114.
 The Utility group displayed general strength. Bell Telephone finished a point up at 157, Consumers Gas 1 1-2 to 115 and Union Gas recorded a minor gain. Senior oils also improved slightly and other industrial groups held steady.
 The gold shares moved irregularly and finished 18 down. Dome weakened 5-8 to 13 1-8, Lake Shore was off 15 to 810.
 Interest in Home Oil revived and the price firmed 15 to 225. In the penny list, Pacalta and United Oil were stronger, while Vermlita took a loss 3-4 to 9 1-4. Royalite took a loss of 1-2-point to 16 1-2.

NEW YORK, July 15—(CP)—The Canadian dollar at a discount of 9 7/8 per cent and the pound Sterling at \$4.04 were unchanged in relation to the United States dollar in today's closing foreign exchange dealings. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount.)

Finance

NEW YORK, July 15—(AP)—The stock market encountered a little resistance today for a first time since early March. Canadian stocks held firm, Winklers edged up 1-7 point, Dome Mines and D'Almeida's 5-8 gram. International Nickel, Brazilian Tracton and Lake Shore Mines 1-8 each. Bell Telephone of Canada, quoted for the first time in weeks, fell 3 points to 111 and Canadian Pacific eased 1-8.

Such leaders as U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, DuPont, Westinghouse and Standard Oil (ND), finished with moderate losses. American Can, Douglas Aircraft, Dow Chemical, Allied Chemical, American Telephone and Telegraph fractions to a point or more higher.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was unchanged at 372. Transfers totaled 89,490 shares compared with 372,650 Tuesday.

The financial sector remained inflation-conscious as brokerage and investment advisory opinions put out more comment on the likely influence of changes in the general price structure.

Montreal Exchange

MONTREAL, July 15—(CP)—All groups slipped in the averages trading today on the stock exchange and curb market. Losses in the main were fractional and voluntary of liquidation was light.

Bell Telephone and Shawinigan backed up a little in utilities on the stock exchange and Winnipeg Electric "A" firmed a bit. Brazilian failed to hold an early increase. Noranda and International Nickel were in arrears in pivotal metals and Consolidated Smelters posted a small rise.

Canadian Car and Massey-Harris were down in industrial's and D'Almeida's edged higher fractionally. International Petroleum was stronger in oils.

Dominion Textile slumped 4 points in miscellaneous and Ogilvie Flour recorded a new low. Imperial Tobacco preferred was also lower and Sherwin-Williams preferred was up more than 4 points.
