CRANBERRIES AT NATIONAL PARK - The season for picking cranberries at the Prince Edward Island National Park will open this year on Monday, Sept. 25th according to information supplied by the National Park authorities. Hundreds of people avail themselves of the opportunity of picking these berries annually and in conversation with Superintendent Smith it is learned that the crop this year is not as good as in past years. Mr. Smith advises that the crop has fallen off about 20 per cent due to the warm hot summer weather. Nevertheless an invitation is extended to all persons interested to avail themselves of the opportunity of obtaining a quantity of cranberries for winter use.

COAL DEALER'S LETTER - In the account of Monday night's special City Council meeting, a regrettable error occurred in the summary of Councilor Gay's remarks. The letter Coun. Gay read to the Council, and to which he took strong exception was from H. R. Large and Company, and not from A. Picard and Company, as stated. It contained the following paragraph: "From the attached schedule of prices you will see that the coal dealers of Charlottetown are handling coal at a ridiculously low profit, and if the City erects two additional city scales causing us inconvenience and subsequent delay this will add to our overhead and there will be but one alternative, and that will be application to the Fuel Controller for permission to raise Charlottetown coal prices in line with other cities." Coun. Gay also quoted from a price list submitted by H. R. Large and Company, according to which Old Sydney coal cost the State consumer 10¢ per ton more than Charlottetown citizens paid for it.

BARN BURNED - A very serious fire occurred at St. Peter's Bay early yesterday morning when the large barn on the estate of the late Mr. J. B. MacInnis caught fire and was completely burned with all its contents, a valuable mare, pigs, and entire crop, the grain having been completed and stored Monday afternoon. Mrs. MacInnis and her little daughter Beatrice had returned from a neighbor's house of mourning and had just the mare in the barn. They were dining lunch when her daughter looking out of the window noticed the fire which had already enveloped the entire roof. Help was summoned and the fire to save the building, which was well known landmark on the old homestead. The wind being favorable the home was saved. Symptomatic goes out to Mrs. MacInnis whose husband passed away less than two years ago. Cause of fire is not known.

Preached Inspiring Sermon at Hazelbrook

On Sunday evening, Sept. 17th in the Hazelbrook United Baptist Church, one of the largest congregations in years gathered the Rev. R. W. Lindsay, a former pastor, now of Margareville, N. S., who conducted service of divine worship and fellowship. In the course of his address Mr. Lindsay said that much is being suggested regarding the post-war world and that it was his opinion that no matter what pacts or international agreements may be drawn up, none shall fulfil the desired purpose or bring the peace and security we need—only the practical application of the principles of life and teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ to the individual, home, religious, industrial, and national life, can be created a better world order. Splendid as are the ideals implied in the Four Freedoms, they are not adequate as is already proved. Only the one great freedom made possible by the life and death of the Lord Jesus Christ, may a world brotherhood be established. "Whom the Son makes free—they are free indeed. To have a new world order we need regenerated men and women. People who are not conformed to this world but who are transformed by the renewing of their minds that they might prove what is that good, and acceptable and perfect will of God."

The speaker further showed the blessedness of being in Christ Jesus. "If any man be in Christ he is a new creature—old things are passed away and all things are become new." The believer has a new source of life, Christ is the vine and the believer is grafted into Christ, there the soul is hid with Christ in God. As Christ's life is pure, holy and unselfish so must the believer in Christ be like Him in thought, word and deed. For it is Christ that lives His life in the redeemed soul. Paul said "I am crucified with Christ, never-theless I live—yet not I, but Christ liveth in me." The believer also has a new environment; previous to the new birth, the soul lived in the environment of condemnation at enmity with God "For they that are in the flesh cannot please God." The new environment is the realm of grace, under the sunshine of God's love and the enjoyment of the glorious liberty of the children of God. "There is therefore now no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus." Together with this, the child of
