HOLLAND GOVERNMENT RESIGNED FOLLOWING THE ELECTIONS.

THE HAGUE, August 2.—Dr. Kirk Bos, a liberal democratic member of the chamber of deputies, who for some time had been endeavoring to form a coalition cabinet, was relieved of the task today by Queen Wilhelmina. Dr. Bos was unable to carry out the wishes of the queen by reason of the fact that the socialists declined to accept portfolios in a coalition ministry.

The formation of a new cabinet is made necessary by the resignation in June of Premier Theodoros Hoemkerk and his ministers, following the elections to the second chamber of the state's general, results of which left the coalition of parties supporting the ministry without a majority in the chamber.

ALWAYS CONSULT THE PHONE DIRECTORY.

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free.

Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department.

and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertisement and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or in the Evening Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified, ad or otherwise.

When for church or charitable purposes the sender seldom ever says so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same, all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches etc than for regular business.

In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editors, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items, etc., of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a new nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notice of a concert, lecture, picnic, etc., are chargeable if there is an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even though a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable.

The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of the past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Versus accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Evening Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are true news.

The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was beautifully clear and mild; clear at night. Saturday was rainy in the forenoon and afternoon, cloudy at night. The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure was sixty-three degrees above zero and with a southern was sixty-five above.

proposed treaty between the United States and Nicaragua evokes a few sarcastic comments in the German press on President Wilson's return to the system of "dollar diplomacy."

Government circles, however, express themselves as perfectly satisfied that if the proposed protectorate over Nicaragua should be established it will diminish the chances of internal disturbances and the possibility of disputes arising in regard to injuries to German subjects resident there, and will also improve the business conditions and the financial stability of the country.

LONDON, July 26.—(Special)—The prospects of peace among the Balkan states were much improved yesterday, the King of Roumania using his influence towards general conciliation. Difficulty, however, is expected to arise through the extreme attitude of Greece in claiming possession of Kavala and Drama, as well as Salonika.

The powers seem to have reached no decision as yet as to how to deal with Turkey. Lord Morley, of Blackburn, questioned on this subject in the House of Lords a reported public discussion of such a critical situation. He practically repeated Premier Asquith's warning to Turkey. He said that he was unable to state what action the powers were prepared to take, and added that the British Government still desired to carry out a policy of supporting the Ottoman Government in the reorganization of its administration and finances.

TOKIO, Aug. 2 (Special).—All Japan is joining in a memorial service for the Emperor Mutsuhito, who died just a year ago. The young Emperor Yoshihito attended a solemn service in the pal-

ace yesterday while thousands of leading citizens of Tokio went to Aoyama, where a temporary chapel was erected on the open ground where the funeral of the late Emperor was solemnized.

The function comprised the offering of "sacred food" by ritualists, while a Shinto orchestra played weird, plaintive music. After an impressive pause the chief ritualist, attired in ancient robes, prayed to the spirit of the dead monarch, whose body lies in the imperial mausoleum at Momoyama, near Kyoto.

The Mayor of Tokio, Baron Yoshiro Sakatani, then, after a prolonged bow before the altar, read an address paying tribute to the dead ruler.

Similar services were held at the Momoyama mausoleum. Theatrical performances and all other forms of entertainment were suspended for the day.

The period of national mourning ends today.

BARCELONA, Aug. 2 (Special).—A strike in the textile industry involving sixty-four factories has been called. The authorities say that from statements made by leaders of the workers under arrest they are fearful that strike will assume a revolutionary character.

As a precaution, reinforcements of troops are being hurried to the city. The Governor of Barcelona says the strike was illegally declared, and announces that he will have seventeen thousand men at the disposal to prevent a revolutionary outbreak.

CALUMET, Mich., Aug. 1 (Special).—Operators of the Lake Superior Copper Mines will be asked officially tomorrow whether they will send five of their number to Lansing to confer in Governor Ferris' office with five representatives of the striking miners.

The news of the Governor's action followed reports of a seriousness between factions of miners near the Superior mine and of sluggings at the northern end of the strike zone. The first arrests of the strike resulted perior men. A fight with clubs, stones men were so severely beaten that there is little chance for their recovery.

Fears of Superior mine strikers that men were coming to replace them caused the outbreak. Ten men appeared and were set upon by Superior men. A fight with clubs, stones and fists resulted.

At North Kearsarge mine Gust Olson, a fireman, was beaten on his way home and required hospital treatment. Olson knocked out four of his opponents, but succumbed to numbers. A squad of militia chased the attacking party but made no arrests.

Further north there were numerous fights, especially about the Mohawk location, where men who had been conferring with the mine management were set upon as they left the office. None of them was seriously injured, but additional troops were sent to that place by General Abbey.

Starting of pumps in the Calumet and Hecla Conglomerate properties was accomplished to-day under a heavy guard of infantrymen. To-night additional guards were placed all about the shaft houses of the companies.

EL PASO, TEXAS, Aug 2 (Special).—All Chinese residents of Northern Mexico have been ordered to the border here and to enter the immigration detention station until after the revolutionary trouble is over. This order was received from Ow Yang Kie, Chinese Consul General at San Francisco. The Consul General also ordered an investigation of the killing of Wong Chew, a Chinese restaurant keeper, at Pearson, Chihuahua, Mexicans alike.

American refugees from Torreon and the interior of Coahuila and Durango continue to arrive here with stories of the terrible suffering they experienced in reaching the border, and the worse suffering American women and children in Torreon were undergoing because they were not strong enough to undertake the desert trip to the border.

The Americans who arrived said that the rebels had Torreon in a state of siege, and that the federal military authorities had seized all the food supplies and were doing out food in half rations to all, Americans and Mexicans alike.

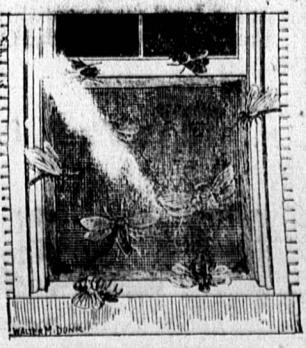
