Notice to Motorists

The Markets

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 14.—Open weather and bad conditions of roads are responsible for the shortage of poultry at Calgary. There is a further decline in the Chicago spot and the Boston market quotations are practically all unchanged from previous report.

Toronto—Some dealers are quoting the lower-range at extras 60 to 64, firsts 50 to 52, pullet extras 46, seconds 32 to 34. Fresh extras are going in a jobbing way at 68 cents, firsts 58 cents, pullet extras 54 cents, seconds 36 cents. Storage eggs are unchanged.

Montreal—This egg market is dropping. Prices to retailers are declining at fresh extras 65 to 70, firsts 60 to 62, pullet extras 58. Prices of storage eggs are weaker. The poultry requirements for Christmas are already purchased and western shippers are now reducing their prices from 1 cent to 3 cents and buyers are holding off for the present.

Calgary—Egg receipts here are nil. Storage stocks are low and storage eggs are jobbing at 42 cents. The poultry market is quiet and unchanged in tone or price.

Edmonton—No change in this egg market. Prices to retailers are extras 48, firsts 45, seconds 30.

St. John—This egg market is firm with fresh eggs scarce. A lively interest is seen in the turkey situation and it is expected that specials and standards are set 40 to 46.

St. John geese are fast to be scarce and they cost 30 cents unit. Some turkeys from P. E. I. are coming here costing 43 cents delivered.

The Late Mr. F. Parker Carvell

There passed away in Montreal on Tuesday afternoon last in his sixty-third year of age, Mr. F. Parker Carvell, a man whose memory will be held in affectionate esteem by his many friends in this city.

He was the last surviving son of the late Hon. J. S. Carvell, one time Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, founder and senior member of the firm of Carvell Bros. in which Mr. Parker Carvell had his earliest business training, being for some time junior partner in the business.

He was later one of the partners in the firm of Carvell, Rattenbury and Messervy, subsequently being engaged in business in Montreal in which city he had resided for the past seventeen years.

During his residence in Charlottetown Mr. Carvell was always to the fore in military circles, and occupied a position of prominence in the city's social life. He was a most ardent and faithful member of the congregation of St. Peter's Cathedral, of whose choir he was reader and precentor for many years.

He married Alexandra M. H. Carey, daughter of Commander Carey, R.N., and to her and other relatives, the Guardian extends its deepest sympathy. The body is being brought home for interment in St. Peter's graveyard, and the funeral service is to be held at St. Peter's Cathedral on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

He was most favourably and widely known in his native Province and his departure at that time was deeply regretted. He married Fannie, youngest daughter of the late Mr. Thomas Owen, in his day Post Master, General of Prince Edward Island, previous to Confederation.

The many friends among the older people on the island of the late Mr. MacGowan will deeply regret to learn of his passing. It was an upright man and greatly respected by all. He would be about seventy-five years of age. There are two daughters and two sons left to cherish his memory, namely: Mrs. W. G. McQuarrie, Mrs. Balloch, Gowan and Keith, all of New Westminster. Mrs. Percy Pope is a sister.

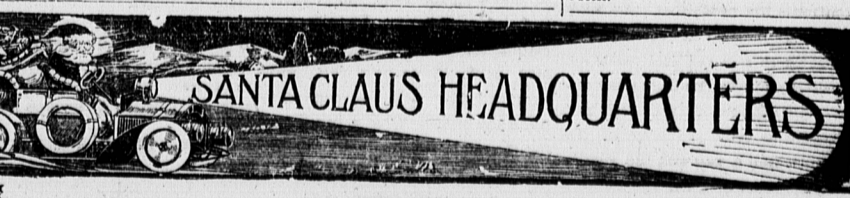
