Cape Breton Kilties dine On Salmon

OTTAWA, June 16—(CP)—Of-ficers of the Cape Breton High-landers, stationed here, dined sumptuously today on 22 pounds of Pacific salmon caught yesterday off Vancouver. The silver-flecked fish which won first prize of a \$50 Victory Bond in a contest sponsored by the West Vancouver Victory Loan Committee, was presented at noon today to Hon. J. L. Isley, Minis-ter of Finance, after having been flown east by Trans-Canada Air-lines. Hundreds of British Columbia fishermen took part in the con-test, which was a feature of the west coast's publicity in support of the Victory Loan campaign. Mr. Isley, who was joined by W. C. Woodward of Vancouver, now special assistant to the Min-ister of Munitions and Supply, motored to the airport here to ac-cept the salmon. It reached Ottawa less than 24 hours after it had been caught. Mr. Isley issued instructions that the fish be for-warded to the officers of the fam-ous Maritime regiment.

Urge Producing Of More Foods FREDERICTON, June 16—(CP)—Realizing that food may be even more a decisive factor in the present war than in the last, country homemakers, who form the largest part of Women's Institute member-ship have stressed the importance of increased production and con-servation of food. Mrs. H. Ducie, Dundurn, Sask., reported in her national review of W. I. agricul-tural activities for the past two years at the annual convention. "The increased production is for home consumption, the surplus to be cured and canned and donated to Great Britain or the needy at home. Commercial supplies will not be disturbed, more vitalizing foods will result and a substantial re-serve created," she stated. Pro-duction of certified seed is an ob-jective of Institutes in British Col-umbia, Ontario, Prince Edward Is-land and Manitoba.

PROVINCIAL EFFORTS Albert members have a food con-servation campaign is full swing with the slogan "not an empty sal-er in the pantry." Saskatchewan, Manitoba and British Columbia and Nova Scotia are "going in" for community canners. The Czech set-tlers near Prescott, Ont., are raising goats to start a glove industry. Quebec and Ontario Institutes have carried out successful rural home beautification projects. Nova Scotia is asking every citizen to enlist as a "soldier of the soil." Prince Edward Island is stressing the "importance of better quality for produce."
