Following is the text of the president's report: "I beg to submit the following report of the year's activities of the Junior Ladies' Aid of the Prince Edward Island Hospital:

"During the year seven monthly meetings were held at the Cundall Home and were, in general, very well attended. Several new members have been added to our group, showing a growing interest among the younger women in Hospital Aid work.

"At the October meeting Mrs. William Henry gave a very interesting report of the Maritime Hospital Aids Association convention which she attended last June at St. Andrew's.

"Last Fall the Junior Aid sponsored Miss Grace Gray, a dietitian and domestic science authority, who gave an interesting lecture on the timely subject 'How to stretch your food dollar,' after which afternoon tea was served by the members of the Aid, and a considerable sum was realized.

"At the formal opening of the Nurses' Training School and Veterans' Wing the Junior Aid, the Senior Aid and Wo-he-lo Club arranged the afternoon tea which was held in connection with the opening ceremony.

"At Christmas, Christmas trees were again placed in the Hospital wards. These were much appreciated by the patients and added to the appearance of the Hospital during the holiday season.

"The second annual parade of Spring Fashions held at the Charlottetown Hotel in March, under the capable sponsorship of Mrs. Robert Large, was very successful. Highlighting this year's show was the delightful musical background furnished by the Wurlitzer Electronic Organ which was demonstrated on this occasion for the first time in Charlottetown. The financial returns were most gratifying and Mrs. Large and her various committees are to be congratulated on their splendid work.

"An electrically controlled Coomo Incubator Bassinet purchased with the proceeds from last year's Fashion Show was delivered early in April and is now in use at the Hospital.

"The annual League of Mercy display and tea was held in May. Many useful articles were contributed and displayed in the Cundall gymnasium. Mrs. Donald Ross, the Convenor, and Mrs. R. E. Kemp, as assistant, are to be congratulated on the splendid display of gifts.

Afternoon tea was served the guests in the Cundall reception room with Mrs. Walter Eickard and Mrs. T. D. DeBlois as convenors.

"During the year members of the

Aid assisted in selling tickets for the annual movie sponsored by the Senior Aid, in the selling of tags on Easter Saturday, and provided refreshments for the Nurses' Valentine Dance.

"Mrs. J. A. Likely represented the Junior Aid at the meeting held in the City Hall by the local Canadian Association of Consumers.

The Board of Trustees very kindly invited a Junior Aid representative to attend the Board meeting. Your President has been attending these monthly meetings which have proved instructive and enjoyable.

"To the members of the Senior Aid who have been so helpful and sympathetic in all our undertakings, to our competent and cooperative Officers who have given unstintingly of their time and talent, and to the faithful band of workers who have all made my term of office so pleasant I wish at this time to express my sincere appreciation. To my successor in office I pledge my support and bespeak for her your continued cooperation in the future activities of the Junior Ladies' Aid.
