ALUMINUM LABORATORIES LIMITED PLANS NEW RESEARCH LABORATORY

MONTREAL, May 28 — Plans for the construction of a new research laboratory for more extensive investigation of problems in the production of aluminum, were announced today by officials of Aluminum Laboratories Limited, subsidiary of Aluminum Limited.

The new laboratory, with which will be incorporated a pilot production plant, is expected to be completed in 1949. The building and equipment, costing in the vicinity of one million dollars, will provide augmented facilities for an already large staff of research scientists and technicians at Arvida.

Research on aluminum has been proceeding at Arvida for a considerable time. This city is a natural choice for the location and extension of research facilities since it is the site of the large aluminum production plant operated by Aluminum Company of Canada, Ltd. The latter company is the principal user of the results of the research.

The Arvida laboratory will be the third modern unit operated by Aluminum Laboratories Limited for industrial research for the Aluminum Limited group of companies. The other laboratories, one at Kingston, Ontario, and the second at Banbury, England, are also adjacent to operating plants and are largely concerned with problems in the fabrication of semi-finished products from light metals.

The research at Arvida, on the other hand, is concentrated on problems in the actual production of light metals, up to and including the extraction of metallic aluminum and magnesium. This involves the investigation of the processes used for the chemical treatment of basic ores and other raw materials and for the electro-chemical and electro-thermal reduction of the metals from their oxides.

NEWSY NOTES

The Spotted Sandpiper

This is the most numerous of our sandpipers; indeed a well-known observer has stated that if one sees a sandpiper at all, it is certain to be this one! Its graceful movements may easily be watched as it runs rapidly along the edge of the water, stopping abruptly to pick up an insect or grub through the tail-wagging performance. This act, which is often repeated, has originated two local names for the bird: it is the "Teeter" or the "Tip-up"; in other localities it is called the "Peewi" from its shrill cry.

"From the economic point of view these birds are decidedly valuable; they feed upon nothing but insects, amongst which small beetles furnish the greater part. I once shot one in a pea field, the stomach of which was filled with pea weevils," says C. Nash, in his "Birds of Ontario."

Spotted Sandpiper. AOU 263. Summer resident, commonest of all sandpipers. Plumage: above, olive-brown, or gray with faint black bars or spots, back with a greenish lustre. Head with a black line from the bill through the eye to the ear, and a white line immediately above it. Wings with the secondaries broadly tipped with white, this showing as a conspicuous light band on each wing as the bird is flying. Belly white, with round blackish spots heaviest on the breast, and the sides. Young birds entirely white, with the breast faintly tinged gray. Length of adults 7.5 inches.

Why I Have No Dahlias

A lady in the west of the Island writes to ask if I still grow dahlias, mentioning a red and white variegated Pompon that I once sent her as a rooted cutting. I am really sorry that I cannot supply my correspondent with dahlias now, since I've given up growing them. Here is the reason.

There are two weeds that are very common in my locality, and probably in many others. They are the Fall Dandelion, and the Pineapple weed (*Marricaria suaveolens*), both belonging to the Composite Family. As a Gray, in his *Manual of Botany* (1908) had already noticed that the Fall Dandelion frequently produced strange greenish-yellow flower-heads with

readers as asked for them. Then the blow fell: the dahlias in the garden became stunted and their flowers were more or less monstrosities. The dahlia is a composite, and offers a special harborage to the disease. It is now known that viruses cannot survive unless inhabiting living matter, and the dahlia tubers offer an ideal resting-place for the pest. Once the tuber is affected, the cuttings only spread the disease, so I went out of dahlias. To take their place I went in for Zinnias, but as these flowers are Composites too, it wasn't long before they, also, took the "yellows." Now I grow a few gladioli instead.

(Up to the time when the electron microscope was invented, nobody had ever seen a virus germ. It is so small. The new microscope can magnify an object 100,000 times, and under it, the influenza virus is shown to be globular in shape while the smallpox virus appears as small cubes.)

As To Gladioli

Last fall was the second season in which I "sulphured" my gladioli. The corms have wintered well and there is no sign of hard rot or any other kind. I had the same results in the spring of 1947, and no thrips that year. The modulus
