**LIGHTS OF SOCIETY CAUGHT IN PAID ON VICE HAUNTS**

**Prisoners Known in Fashionable World of Newport and New York, Hide Names From Philadelphia Police**

—Outlook for Aftermath of Scandal and Divorce.

PHILADELPHIA, July 10.—The Tenderloin of this city has been practically wiped out by the tremendous raids made upon its disorderly places by the police on Saturday night, and Philadelphia is shrouded as it had not been stirred before for a quarter of a century.

For in this raid, in which 105 resorts were entered and 508 prisoners were captured, there were men and women whose names adorn the blue book of society, who are well known figures in Newport, New York and Paris and who had to use all their fineness and influence to keep their highly respected names from being trailed in the mire. That there will come an undermath of divorce and scandal few who are cognizant of the facts can doubt.

Of the 508 prisoners taken more than 400 are still in jail. They consist of clubmen, lawyers, business men whose names are known throughout the city, sports and highfliers, young scions of society from the Germantown section, and in some instances, their sisters and their cousins and their aunts.

There has been a struggle to obtain bail and to cover up scandals. Absolutely no mercy was shown. Rich and poor, old offenders and young were scooped up in the same net and carted away to jail. The police were frank in their brutality. They realized that they were killing their own grubs, and the incidental slaughter of half a hundred fine old Quaker reputations was neat and drink to them.

REAL NAMES HIDDEN.

It was a curious sight to see men of wealth and influence in the city walking up to the magistrate courts to proffer bail for relatives or friends caught in the raid. In not a single instance did the men or women prisoners of good repute give their real names. As is always the case in a raid, the women got by far the hardest treatment. A man of prominence would be called to the bar only to give a fictitious name and fade away with a \$10 fine.

In every instance the woman, no matter of what family or reputation was looked upon as an "innate" and fined \$300. In nine cases out of ten there was no bail forthcoming, and the better ones were led weeping back to their cells. Many of them were of good families, many were married, many were visitors to the city.

These were heart-breaking revelations when they were forced openly to attempt to get bail. But tears, moans and hysterics from the better ones and curses and maledictions from the hardened old timers were alike to the police. In a very few instances Magistrates Eisenbrown O'Brien, Koehrsperger and Ladner allowed themselves to be swayed by the pleading of young girls, whose appearances indicated that they were not beyond reformation. But, generally speaking, no pull was sufficient to obtain release, and every

**"WEEKLY" CHANGED TO "TRI-WEEKLY"**

The "Weekly Edition" of "The Charlottetown Guardian" was changed on July 1st to a "Tri-Weekly Edition." This was done because it is considered that the "Weekly" is too slow for a province with so many daily and tri-weekly mails as that of Prince Edward Island. In the past, four or eight pages have been printed on Friday, eight on Saturday or Monday and these twelve or sixteen pages have been held until the following Wednesday when eight more have been printed and then the entire twenty or twenty-four pages have been mailed as one paper to all subscribers. Thus the news of about two thirds of the issue is so old as to be of very little value when it reaches its destination the week following its actual publication. Now each section is mailed on Monday, Wednesday and Friday as soon as off the press. All the news is thus fresh, and each section of ads. and reading matter much more likely to be read thoroughly than if the entire twenty to twenty-four pages arrived but once a week, and all at one time. All advertisements will appear in but one section of each entire week's issue as in the past, unless it is desired that they appear more frequently, in which case arrangements can be made with the management. Regular advertisers in the past have been required to have "changes" in not later than Saturday, and by the time the paper reached subscribers the following week it was often desirable that other goods arriving in the meantime be advertised. Under the three-a-week issue "changes" received up to either Tuesday, Thursday, or Saturday at ten a. m. will be printed in either the Wednesday, Friday or Monday issue respectively, and thus reach readers when new and fresh. Transient advertisements can appear either once, twice or thrice a week as arranged for. It is believed that all readers will appreciate the change, as they will in future receive a paper, issued each Monday, Wednesday and Friday of every week instead of twenty to twenty-four pages issued but Wednesday of each week. Advertisers very much prefer that their ads appear but once a week in a tri-weekly rather than in a Weekly of two or three times the size, as they are much more likely to be read carefully.
