LONDON, March 27.—The British steamer Ortega, from Liverpool for Valparaiso, sent an "S.O.S." message from latitude 52 North, Longitude 5 West, (close of Linney Head on the South Eastern Coast of Wales) asking for assistance. The message said the steamer desired to be towed back to Liverpool as she was battling with heavy seas coming in from leeward. A message to Lloyd's says that the Captain of the Ortega has decided to attempt to reach Fishguard.

Number one hold is full of water and the steamer El Paraguaya, is standing by.

The Ortega has 120 first class; 100 second class; and 140 third class passengers aboard.

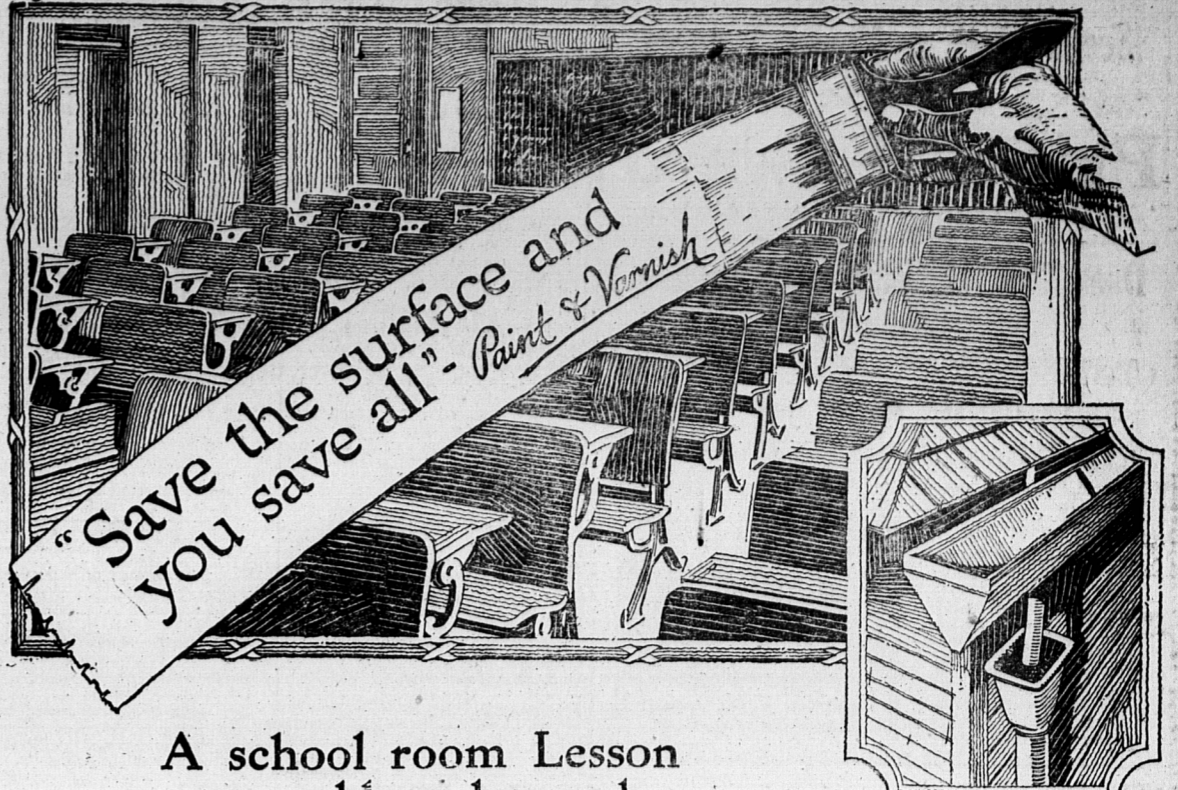

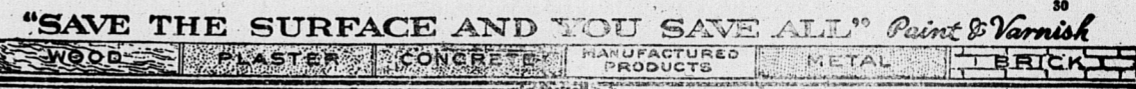
