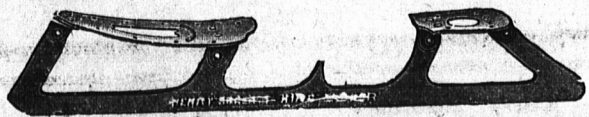

## PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE

An up-to-date screen allegory entitled "The Grail" in two reels tells how Jean, the banker's daughter, puts her lover to the proof and how he proves himself a real Sir Galahad. The girl's father, old Griswold, is saved from ruin by the sacrifice of young Williamson's newly inherited fortune. It also vanishes and the banker robs to save himself. Williamson assumes the blame and disappears. On the deserts of Nevada he again proves to the girl his knightly claim.

A clever little mix-up comedy, "His Wife's Secret," in one part, is a humorous depiction of the amount of trouble a little deception may cause. "You pretend to be married to my wife and that I am a boarder" is the husband's plan, but it fails to work out successfully.

"Chip of the Flying O" features Kathryn Williams and Tom Mix in a stirring comedy of cowboy life in three parts. Claude Bennett, the young cartoonist, goes West and is soon ranch foreman. The old man's sister, a "she doctor," arrives in camp and soon has the boys at her feet. The girl's skill in curing broken legs is only rivalled by Claude's skill in painting pictures, and the inevitable result is finally attained.

Billy Reeves gets fired from the movie actors for funk, and joins the U.S. Navy (which does not seem to be particular how it turns an honest penny). In the "black watch" the steam pressure falls at an alarming rate. His daring plan to become a hero rapidly materialises, but the bottom falls out of it, as usual, in the long run.

## IN MEMORIAM

MRS. EMMA JENKINS

In the death of Mrs. Emma Jenkins on November 30th, Georgetown loses an aged and respected citizen. She was born in Charlottetown in 1828 and was in her 90th year. Her maiden name was Emma Bagnall, daughter of James and Anna Matilda Gardiner Bagnall. She was the last surviving grand child of Samuel Bagnall a United Empire Loyalist who settled in Charlottetown in 1787 and also a granddaughter of John Rhodes Gardiner, a United Empire Loyalist who settled in Bedouque about the same time as Samuel Bagnall. She married Nicholas Jenkins, of Pownall and was the mother of the following family: Richard R. Jenkins, Wallace W. Jenkins and Mrs. Thomas Lavers, of Georgetown, Percy W. Jenkins of New York, Edward Jenkins of Boston, George Jenkins of Govan, Sask., Mrs. Milton Walsh of Charlottetown and Fred B. Jenkins of Springfield, Mass. The latter two predeceased her. Mrs. Walsh died in August 1915 and Fred B. Jenkins died in August 1904.

MR. JOHN BROWN.

The death occurred at Charlottetown, on November 20th, 1915, after a long illness, of Mr. John Brown, eldest son of the late James Curtis Brown and his wife Catherine, Smallwood, of Cove Head, P. E. I. The deceased was born at Cove Head, 20th August, 1829 and had reached the advanced age of 86 years. For many years he was a consistent member of Grace Methodist Church. The funeral ceremony took place at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. John C. McLeod and was conducted by Rev. Mr. Littlejohn and Rev. Mr. Taylor, while Rev. Mr. McHattie officiated at the grave. He leaves to mourn, besides a sorrowing widow, three daughters:—Mrs. W. C. Schirman, Summerside, Mrs. C. B. Murlay and Mrs. John C. McLeod, Charlottetown also the following brothers and sisters:—Robert W. and Mrs. John McGregor, Charlottetown, James C. of Florida, Charles, Neponset, Mass., Mrs. Neil Barrach and Mrs. J. Coffin, Fortune Bay, P. E. I. He was laid to rest in Brookfield Cemetery beside his son and daughter, who predeceased him many years ago.
