The city has 1,342 streets and 76,531 buildings of which 3,724 are vacant. RECIPROCIITY AIRED IN PARLIAMENT. LONDON, Feb 10—The amendment to the Address in reply to the Speech from the throne, introduced to the House of Commons by Austen Chamberlain, urging Fiscal Reform with special reference to the proposed Reciprocity Agreement, was rejected by a vote of 324 to 222. The Laborites and Nationalists voted with the Government. OTTAWA, Feb 10—The total immigration into Canada for the past eight months was 243,171 compared with 150,256 for the same period last year.
