Stevens In Quebec City

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) QUEBEC, Sept. 17—A swift trip by automobile from Campbellton, N. B., where he spoke last night brought Hon. H. H. Stevens, Reconstruction Party leader, here tonight. Accompanied by his son, Rev. Francis H. Stevens, the Reconstruction Party leader reached Quebec via Levis, and went to rest and prepare for his meeting here tomorrow night.

Tomorrow's meeting is not the first of his Quebec campaign—he spoke in Montreal on his way to the Maritimes—but it will be the only one in this part of the province. He plans to speak also at Sherbrooke, and again in Montreal. A meeting scheduled for Hull next Saturday night has been cancelled in view of the fact Mr. Stevens will speak in nearby Ottawa the following Monday.

On his way here from Campbellton Mr. Stevens spoke briefly at Rimouski, and stopped off at Riviere du Loup where he met some of his supporters, but made no address.

Reconstruction Party Elects Candidates

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Sept. 17—A Reconstruction Party convention here tonight selected Rev. John Furlong, Rector of St. Mark's Anglican Church, and Dr. J. J. Power, K. C., veteran barrister, to contest the constituency of Halifax in the October elections. They will oppose R. E. Finn, K. C., and Gordon E. Isnor, Liberals, and L. A. Gastonguay and R. D. Guilford, Conservatives.

ANTIGONISH, N. S., Sept. 17—Howard MacKeighan, president of the Canadian Livestock Association, was nominated as a candidate for the House of Commons here today at a Reconstruction Party convention of the Antigonish-Guysborough constituency.

He was given a clear majority over Cyrus MacLellan, Williams Point farmer, and J. D. MacIntyre, Antigonish barrister, in the convention polling.

Mr. MacLellan's nomination at a convention Aug. 15 was declared irregular.

Higher Bread Prices Seen

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 17—The World-Telegraph says today leaders of the banking industry believe that higher bread prices are a distinct possibility soon.

These leaders were quoted as warning that the quality of wheat loaves, furthermore, may be lowered sharply because of an unprecedented situation in the country's grain business.

Good quality wheat for bread making was said to be obtainable only with difficulty now, although the 1935 harvest only recently has been completed. Supplies from now on until harvest next year were thought to be inadequate.

Beecham Creates Stir Breaks Windows

BRIGHTON, Eng., Sept. 18.—(A.P.)—Sir Thomas Beecham, the black-bearded conductor, composer and operatic impresario who rebuked bejewelled dowagers at a Covent-Garden opera once for "chattering" during the overture, caused a new sensation at a concert tonight reopening the Brighton Dome.

Before a distinguished audience in the hall, recently rebuilt by a corporation at a cost of \$250,000, the noted conductor, instead of praising the building, launched into a bitterly critical speech.

Complaining of the "warmth" in the building, he asserted the windows of the dressing room were "hermetically sealed" and impossible to open.

"I have put my stick through three or four of the windows," he announced, "and before I go home tonight I'm going to put it through all of them."

"I am waiting for some celebrated prima donna to visit this building. Then there will be an atmosphere within these walls compared to which a tempest outside will be insignificant."

The conductor said he had been forced to walk "three flights of stairs" to his room.

"I congratulate you on this magnificent structure," he said. "I hope it will be some use to you. It is no earthly use to me."

Higher Living Standard Urged

FREDERICTON, N.B., Sept. 18.—(C.P.)—"Cancer occupies second place among what is vulgarly known as the 'killing' diseases, and New Brunswick is preparing to wage war on this monster enemy of the human family, as it obtains in this Province," declared Hon. Dr. W. P. Roberts, Minister of Health and Labor, in addressing the annual convention of the New Brunswick Association of registered nurses here yesterday. "The greatest weapon we possess is education or knowledge concerning the condition," the speaker maintained.

The delegates were welcomed to Fredericton by Mayor W. G. Clark. Miss A. J. MacMaster, Moncton, President of the Association, replied to the address of welcome.

"I believe, and always have believed, that there does not exist any more honorable, more sacrificial and more humane calling to which woman may dedicate herself than to that of the profession of nursing, said Dr. Roberts. In congratulating the New Brunswick Association of Registered Nurses upon the wonderful progress that has been made during the last few years in their efforts to raise the standard required of those entering upon the study of professional nursing, both as regards physical and educational qualifications."

The mental hygiene situation in New Brunswick was "one of which we should indeed be ashamed," the Minister of Health and Labor declared. "It is costing us thousands of dollars annually from a medico-legal angle. It is furnishing dry kindling wood for crime. It constitutes an atmosphere in which immorality thrives and the unfortunate part of it all is that marriage and matrimony continue to obtain without supervision with resulting rapid increase of population of a similar character, and little or nothing has as yet been done to recognize this state of affairs as a menace to the well being of our province."

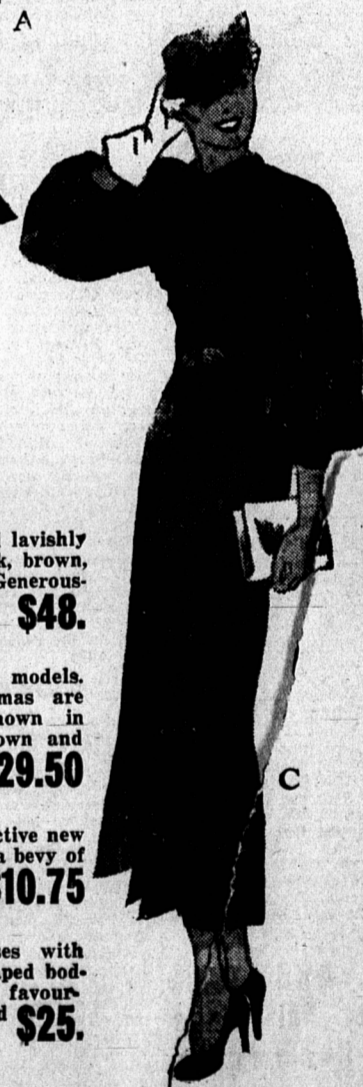
