COME ALONG BOYS IS WORD FROM THE FIRING LINE

Interesting Letter from Capt. A. R. B. Duck At The Front.

On the Belgian Frontier, Oct. 20, 1915.

Dear Friend Louisa,—Just a year to day since I first saw Salisbury Plains and I only wish I could put on paper what I have seen and what I have thought the last year. Some day I hope to be lucky enough to get back where I can have a quiet hour or so to do it. I hardly know what to write about this time. I think the last time I wrote you I made one or two phrases about the war. One I remember, was I took objection to the Kaiser's statement that the war would finish in October and said that October would see some very hard fighting on the Western line. Well I was right. We did have a very serious scrap here in October and the war has not ended. So you see I beat Kaiser Bill this time, and hope to be in at the time when the masses of the Allies play "It's a long long way to Tipperary" in Berlin for, believe me, nothing else will satisfy the boys out here.

Well, since I last wrote you I have been over in Old England on seven days' leave, and England looked far nicer than ever. One thing that strikes one over there is the country, it looks so nice and clean. After spending over eight months here the change is sudden. From torn, ugly fields, duty in the extreme, to the quiet, clean fields with the well-cultivated hedges, is a pleasant change, and I did not see much time in getting out to the country. I cannot describe one's feelings over there; only can say, it nerves one to come back and do all his power to hasten the time when peace will be signed. I don't think there was a minute of the seven days but I thought of dear Prince Edward Island and of you all, so comfortable at home, also, and forgive me for saying it, I also thought if they only would grasp at home—that this means—how quickly it would be over. But it seems as if the British Empire is a long way yet. Why don't they wake up now you may think Canada is done enough. Well, come out here for one week and I am sure you will

change your ideas. Prince Edward Island has done well, but why not another regiment of Infantry? I know the place and I also know that there are over a thousand men yet who can leave home easily, and we want them here, for I know what I am saying when I tell you that Canadians are worth a good deal above par right here. They have never yet fallen down in any task set them. If they are told they are to take a certain place the place is taken. So please put it as strong as you can "COME ALONG BOYS WE WANT YOU AND WANT YOU BADLY." I do wish I could just have one hour with the young men of Prince Edward Island and I am sure they would listen. I could tell them so much that I cannot write about! Now I have said more than I intended to on this subject but you will understand and we think of nothing out here but how to win and how long it is going to take. When we read of elections taking place at home, people thinking of nothing more than of which party will win, and if the voters will run twice or six times a week, and of cabinet members in Great Britain resigning because some body forgot to address them by their right (?) title, etc., it sure makes one sore. Why doesn't everybody throw all feelings aside and remember the Empire, and only think that the British people, struggling against almost impossible odds, in fact, fighting for his life and not play fast and loose with their very existence? Just look over the last year and see where we have been beaten by a people we will think call our superiors. You may think I am being a bit over the top, but believe me we are up against something serious and you cannot put it too strong to the people at home. Send us men and lots of them with plenty of ammunition and I vouch for the rest.

Will you want to hear something else, what we are doing, well, well we are doing all right; we have a very important point in the line, a point that has to be held no matter what happens, and it is going to be held as long as there are enough Canadians and wages expected.
