**THE WAR LOAN.**—It is understood that The Eastern Trust Company, Halifax, has put in subscriptions for the New War Loan for themselves and clients amounting in the aggregate to \$475,000.00.

**EXCHANGED PULPITS.**—Rev. Mr. Brown, of the Methodist Church, Murray Harbor, went to Souris on Saturday where he officiated at the Methodist services Sunday, exchanging pulpits with the pastor.

**ONE HUNDRED CANADIAN PRISONERS OF WAR** now provided for by this Province, Saturday's mail brought adoption by Mrs. Jas. Lynds, Kensington and the Presbyterian Church, Clyde River, which makes a total of one hundred. Canon Shippin is now appealing for the second hundred, as many societies and individuals are yet to be heard from in this good cause. \$4.50 per month saves a prisoner from starving.

**FANNING BROOK.**—A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in MacLean, L. O. L., on Wednesday night the 21st inst. for the purpose of raising some money for the Orphanage at Mount Herbert. The Rev. D. MacLean of Charlottetown gave an interesting address on the Orphanage and although speaking for considerably more than an hour he was listened to with the most rapt attention. He spoke of the origin of the work, the difficulties surmounted, the present standing of the Institution and the great need of funds & a vote of thanks was tendered by the meeting and presented by the chairman, Bro. David Birt. A sale of pies then took place. Daniel Birt, David Birt and Wilbur Birt acting as auctioneers. As a result of the meeting the sum of forty-two dollars (\$42.00) was placed in the hands of the G. Treasurer. —Com.

**WEDDING BELLS.**—A quiet but very pretty wedding took place at the residence of the Rev. J. Douglas McKenzie, 247 Prince St., when Miss Margaret Irene, daughter of Malcolm and Mrs. McLellan, Reserve St., was united in marriage to Mr. Alexander A. McDonald of the P. E. I. R. The bride wore a handsome tailored suit of blue serge and carried a beautiful bouquet of pink roses and maiden hair fern, and was attended by her sister Miss Christine, who wore a suit of brown and carried a bouquet of carnations. The groom was ably supported by Mr. Edley V. Foster of the P. E. I. R. After the ceremony the bridal party drove to the home of the bride where a sumptuous repast was served. Only the immediate relatives and friends of the contracting parties were present. The presents were numerous and costly testifying the high esteem in which the young couple are held. Mr. and Mrs. McDonald will reside in Charlottetown.

**A LONG VOYAGE.**—There arrived at Halifax last week a vessel which has been trying to reach Halifax from Prince Edward Island ever since December—the schooner Marina. Captain Melvin A. Greek who claims that he would have finished his voyage before Christmas had he not been held up four weeks at Georgetown, waiting to complete his cargo of 1,900 bushels potatoes and 900 bushels cats. The ice in the Strait of Canso first caught him at Hawkesbury, where he was forced to stay three weeks. Then the Marina managed to reach Canso where she was practically frozen in until two weeks ago and since then Captain Greek has been battling with ice tows and adverse winds along the coast, putting in at Whitehead and Isaac's Harbor en route. In spite of the delay and severe winter weather the Marina's potatoes were found to be in excellent condition when the hatches were opened upon arrival here. The potatoes were stowed beneath the oats. The Marina is at Central wharf. Joseph Wood is the consignee of the cargo.

**JOINS THE NAVY.**—Among passengers leaving by the Car-ferry today for Halifax was Mr. W. H. Palmer of this city, who has been accepted for service in the Navy. Mr. Palmer is a veteran of the United States army, having served in the campaign against the Spanish in Cuba in 1898. When the present war broke out he volunteered and was accepted for the 26th Battalion. He was only with the unit for three months or a little more when he received his discharge as physically unfit, owing to being troubled with rheumatism. Nothing daunted, with the call for naval recruits was made he again volunteered, this time deciding to try his luck on the water in the Empire's behalf. He will take a position in the engine room on one of His Majesty's ships, a spot where he believes his rheumatism will not have the nerve to follow him.

**PARLOR SOCIAL SUCCESSFUL.**—Of the many enjoyable entertainments held in Cornwall and vicinity this winter, the parlor social, Wednesday March 14, held at Miss K. Macdonald's, West River, under the auspices of the Cornwall, York Women's Institute, was voted the best. Hughes, the President, opened the meeting and gave an explanation of the system endorsed at a previous meeting, which is to be followed in the coming season, and also expressed his opinion as to the great benefits of an Egg Circle. Mr. J. A. O'Keefe in the absence of the Secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting at which the following Directors for the ensuing year were elected: President—J. D. Hughes; Vice-Pres.—J. P. Delaney; Sec'y-Treas.—Alphonsus O'Donnell. Directors—J. A. O'Keefe, Joseph Carmichael, Augustine Wisner, Joseph Redmond. Mr. A. F. **MR. BLONDIN'S GOOD EXAMPLE**

MONTREAL, March 24—Hon. Mr. Blondin's resignation for the purpose of entering the army and carrying on a recruiting campaign is regarded as the best thing that has happened in this province since the war started. The Star says in part: "The action of Hon. P. E. Blondin in tendering his resignation as Post Master General in order that he may serve his country with our overseas forces, is one which will be received with acclaim and admiration throughout this Dominion. No man has a firmer hold upon his compatriots in this province than Mr. Blondin. His recruiting speeches have always been inspiring and effective. It is intimated that he will now undertake to recruit a battalion and take it with him overseas. It is easy to expect success for him and to see in that success an answer to the Liberal's attacks which have been made, from time to time on this province. The truth is that Quebec is singularly well represented just now in the Dominion cabinet. Hon. Mr. Sevigny came through the fire in the Dorchester election and proved his mettle by storming what many thought a difficult position and carrying it with a sweep. The stock of French Canadians went up many points throughout the Empire on the morrow of the Dorchester election, and now Mr. Blondin, who has long desired to abandon his parliamentary desk for the bivouac of the soldiers, follows the ideals of his hope and enlists for active service 'Somewhere in France.' His action will be an inspiration to the French Canadians, and a promise to his allied workers. Such personal sacrifice will offset months of mischievous agitation and flame as a beacon fire lighting the path of glory and honor. This message of love and sympathy from French Canadians will touch the heart of old France as nothing else will and then they will see that 'Blood will tell' that the separated sons of Normandy are Normans still. Mr. Blondin has grasped the fiery cross in the hour of greatest crisis and he will see Quebec righteously aflame from the Ottawa River to the Gulf.
