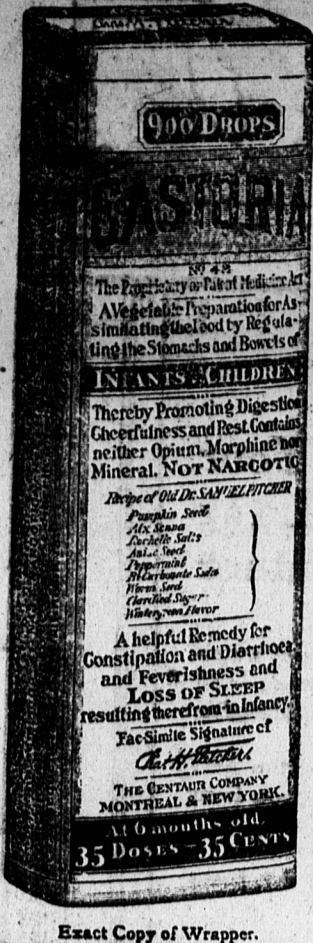

—HERO RETURNS Among the young men to return home Saturday night from England, was L.Cpl. Monty Hennessy of Cape Traverse Cpl. Hennessy enlisted in the 55th Battalion in 1915 and took part in considerable heavy fighting, and the latter part of 1918, got a flesh wound in the arm, but soon returned to the firing line and was gassed slightly, he was sent to England where it was found he had pneumonia, and was unconscious for seven days. He spent a few months in the hospital. His many friends and relatives, are proud indeed to see him looking so well and have him home again. Monty certainly tells many experiences about the battle field, and says he never was sorry for going, but is sure glad to be one of the lucky ones to return to his native land where the Sun shines. L.Cpl. Hennessy has another brother George in France who enlisted in the 105th Battalion and escaped without a scratch and won a Military Medal for bravery on the battlefield. He expects to return to his home in March or April. Congratulations to those two young heroes. Monty expects to be home two weeks when he will go to a hospital for treatment, his many friends wish him good luck and hope to see him return home restored to his usual good health.
