In the death of Capt George McLeod on the 16th December, ult., BuTalo, N. Y. lost one of its best liked marine-insurance men, one whose wide experience and ability in his line of work made him very valuable to the interests for which he labored and whose uniform courtesy and kindness endeared him to all who came into contact with him. Although he had been ailing for some time, his death was quite unexpected by his large circle of friends and acquaintances. For about a year and a half he had not been able to perform the duties of his position of marine wrecking master of the office of Smith, Davis & Co., and for about four weeks he had been confined to his home. Locomotor ataxia was the chief ailment. Capt McLeod was born on May 1st 1838 at New London, Prince Edward Island. He went to sea when fourteen years old, and sailed to all parts of the world before he came to the great lakes in the spring of 1856.

Surviving Capt McLeod are his wife and a son and daughter. The son Dr. E. J. McLeod and the daughter is the wife of Thomas J. O'Brien of the Chamber of Commerce. Miss Ellen Kennedy, daughter of Capt McLeod's first wife, always lived with him as a member of his family.

The school is reported in good condition. At the close of the examination the pupils were treated to fruit and confectionary by the teacher, Miss Katie Wilson.

The Methodist District meetings, of which there are two on Prince Edward Island meet twice annually for the discharge of their regular business. While this is sufficiently frequent so far as the official demands of the work are concerned it gives little opportunity for other considerations. The Summerside District, therefore, of which Rev. Geo. Steel is chairman at a special ministerial gathering at Summerside on the 27th inst, organized itself into a District Ministerial Association for the promotion of spiritual, fraternal and intellectual interests among the members and within the district. Dr. Hammond Johnson, of Summerside, was chosen as secretary. The next meeting will be held in Summerside in the latter part of February, and at regular intervals thereafter. The first meeting proved most helpful, all the ministers being present except Rev. Henry Pierce, whose duties detained him. The Chairman explained recent changes in the ritual and discipline made by the late General Conference. An informal conference was had on method of church work and administration. The present status of the union question was also discussed, and the proposed creed carefully considered. The afternoon session was brought to a close by Brother, Mr. Stebbings, of Tryon, giving a most interesting account of his recent trip to England, and a comparison of English and Canadian Methodism. At next meeting will be discussed: How to promote the temporal and spiritual interest of circuits, by Rev. A. D. McLeod; The promotion of Personal Religion, by Rev. Thos. Stebbings; and Reviews and Criticisms of recent publications by Rev. Geo. Steel. The ministers of the District are Rev. Geo. Steel, Thos. Stebbings, Hammond Johnson, J. B. Gough, Henry Pierce, E. E. Styles, A. D. McLeod, Hugh Miller, and F. A. Wightman.
