The first stable flight of Canada geese to reach the province arrived in the week. The big birds began to arrive on Sunday evening in a section south and east of the City and by Tuesday night close to 300 of the big honkers were concentrated in a fairly restricted area. With rare Blue Bird weather prevailing observers are puzzled over the sudden appearance of such a large number of wild geese at this time of the year. It is the pleasant type of weather we have been experiencing for the past weeks.

The geolings in the flocks have to pass their time frequently and the fresh water lakes in the vicinity were well patronized. Old timers tell me it seemed like old times to see the flock after flock of honking geese, ranging from a dozen to 50 birds in a flock, streaming into a certain lake. The unexpected arrival of the geese caught the gunners unawares and at time of writing only two geese have been reported shot from this flight. A merchant and a prominent Wholesale confectioner from the City are reported to be the lucky snipers. At time of writing it is apparent that this concentration of geese has a great deal to do with which to establish a feeding base.
