During his trip he had also the pleasure of meeting Colonel (Dr.) H. D. Johnson, Dr. Alex. Ross, Major W. B. Prowse, and Mr. Charles Toombs. All members of the Charlottetown Chess Club, who wished to be remembered to all their friends at home. Mr. Toombs who had just been invited to England from the scenes of activity in France, was getting along nicely when Mr. Gardiner saw him. The Chess Club expect to hold their annual field day about the last of next month and an enjoyable outing is anticipated.

"GHOSTS" AT THE PRINCE EDWARD—One of the most powerfully dramatic plays ever reproduced in film, Ibsen's "Ghosts," was the chief feature at the Prince Edward Theatre last evening when there were full houses at both performances. "Ghosts" is a problem play dealing with the subject of heredity and vividly portrays how what is bred in the bone—or blood—develops and comes to maturity in the offspring. The theme is not a pleasant one—none of Ibsen's plays is—but its painful realism is a welcome change from the average film shown on the cinematograph. Seldom is such acting seen out of the capitals of the world. It holds the spectator spellbound from the first scene of the first act to the last scene of the fifth act. Ibsen shows how the cultivation of a love for strong drink in the child of a parent given to the use of intoxicants ultimately leads to his enslavement and ruin body and soul, and how a child of passion, notwithstanding her careful upbringing, finally throws respectability to the wind. There is no happy ending to the play. Ibsen tries to prove that there is no earthly salvation for those with the hereditary taint of moral weakness. The lesson to be drawn is that those cursed with organic weakness must be safeguarded from temptation until they themselves have obtained the mental mastery. Every parent should see this play, everyone having the interest of the community at heart will learn something from its powerful though silent portrayal on the screen. An antidote to the realistic drama is provided by the production of a highly diverting comedy entitled "The Rocky Road to Love."

A COMRADE'S TRIBUTE TO CHUM KILLED IN BATTLE

Mr. A. J. Robinson, R. R. No. 1 Cape Traverse has received the following letter from an officer of the 26th Battalion. Private Arthur Clinton Robinson referred to was the first F. E. Island boy to enlist for overseas service. Soon after the declaration of war he went to Halifax with Major F. Boulter and from there was transferred to St. John, N. B., and who joined the 26th Battalion, won for themselves the name of "The Fighting 26th." He was killed in action on March 27, 1916: Somewhere in Flanders.

My Dear Mr. Robinson: I belong to the sixteenth platoon, and have been with your son ever since we first met in St. John. This is just a line to sympathize with you, as we have lost one of our best chums and one who was gone to the last minute. He, three others, and I used to bunk together, and now only two of us are here; two are convalescent in England. Art was most popular with the boys, being the life of the platoon, and there is no one I miss more. We all admired him for his unselfishness and the clean life he led. I was on leave in England when he was killed. Our battalion had a very bad time of it that week, and in our platoon alone three of the old boys (not reinforcements) went out. I am told Art's death was a painful one; a splinter from a shell went through the diary which was in his left breast pocket. He was buried just in the rear of our line, where many of the boys are sleeping peacefully, and which will always be "Canada" to us.

We are in a different part of the line now, and not so quiet as we were. While writing this, I have had to keep dodging the shrapnel that is flying from bursting shells near by. You and yours have my deepest sympathy. You have every reason, as we have, to be proud of your son's life, and although it seems hard to us, it is
