PLAN PRISON REFORM IN NEW SOUTH WALES

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 12 (CP)—The Labor government of New South Wales has decided to bring its prisons up-to-date, mainly as the result of a trip to Britain and North America by L.G.J. Nett, controller-general of prisons.

Main improvements will be: New uniforms for prisoners along the lines of my battle-dress rather than shapless jackets and trousers; more and better educational classes for prisoners, and classes in psychology, sociology and prison management for wardens; communal dining rooms for prisoners instead of solitary cell meals; beds instead of hammocks in cells; outdoor recreation instead of prison yard walks; film projectors for every prison.

The government decided to continue its present system of letting prisoners earn money while in jail. Some skilled prisoners can earn as much as 12 shillings a week here.

SCOTS WILL RESTORE JERUSALEM MEMORIAL

GLASGOW, Oct. 12 (CP)—A campaign has been launched to raise \$2,000 to repair the Scots Memorial in Jerusalem, which was damaged during recent fighting.

The building commemorates Scots who died in the Middle East in the First World War. The funds will be used to add a Second World War memorial and acquire adjacent land.
