Stock Price Advance Slowed On Saturday
NEW YORK, Jan. 9—(AP)—The stock market swung ahead last week with the sharpest overall gain since October.

The advance ground to a halt in Saturday's short session but only after something like \$1,400,000 had been added during the week to the market value of all stocks listed on the New York Exchange. Prices got a bad shaking on Monday but from then on the direction was forward.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks remained at 65.9. Volume of 370,000 shares compared with 360,000 Dec. 18, the last Saturday the market was open.

At Toronto
TORONTO, Jan. 9—(CP)—Prices were irregularly mixed in a moderately active short session on the Toronto Stock Exchange Saturday. Golds dipped under pressure of mild profit-taking. Base metals held steady while western oils showed the steepest declines.

Gold moved sluggishly and junior producers showed the effect of profit-taking. Seniors held firm and losses ranged up to about five cents in a mixed junior list. Several speculative attracted active trading.

MONTREAL, Jan. 9—(CP)—Although a few selected issues managed to score wide gains during the first week of trading in 1949 on the Montreal Stock Exchange and Curb Market, the majority of stocks were on merely a fractional uptrend.

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Taking a quick peak into the future, the Bureau said in its monthly review of the world wheat situation that it saw a "distinct" possibility of substantial world wheat supplies this year, though it warned that adverse weather in the large producing areas could easily change the outlook.

It noted, for example, that weather already has taken its toll of the current wheat harvest in Argentina, where a November frosts and prolonged drought have reduced crop estimates from 180,000,000 bushels to around 150,000,000, down some 100,000,000 bushels from the previous harvest.

But on the other side of the world, in Australia, a satisfactory maturing weather has brought a crop now estimated at around 190,000,000 bushels, some 30,000,000 below last year's crop but still 20,000,000 above the 1935-39 average.

Though both countries have moderate carry-overs of old grain, the Bureau said their contribution to world trade during 1949 will be less than in 1948.

Turning to the home front, the Bureau said it is considered likely spring wheat plantings will increase in Western Canada this year. Low prices now prevailing for flourseed and rye may divert acreage from these crops to wheat.
