Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 9, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. W. W. COBY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. 9-1549m

THERE are no stock quotations this morning, yesterday being Thanksgiving Day in the United States.

THE Polino, which sailed Wednesday with coal for Quebec from Sydney will probably be the last steamer to go up the St. Lawrence this season.

THE S. S. City of London goes to Crapaud tomorrow morning at 7.00 and to Belfast, China Point and Orwell on Monday morning at 7.00 o'clock.

A LARGE attendance was present at Prince Edward Division last evening. Four candidates were nominated and nine proposed. A splendid program of violin solos, speeches etc. was rendered.

THERE were five passengers in from Orwell on the return trip of the S. S. City of London yesterday at noon. The cargo consisted of 2,575 bushels oats, 9 tubs butter, 8 sheep, 7 dressed hogs and 3 cases chickens.

SAMUEL McPHERSON killed at Cranbrook, B. C., is a son of John McPherson of Whitton Road Cross. He resided at Montague during the summer and in the autumn left with the harvest excursionists for the Northwest. His father who is now in Massachusetts has been notified. He deceased was 28 years of age.

A MATCH game of Basket Ball will be played in the Hillsboro Skating Rink on Saturday morning at half past nine between the Prince of Wales College team and the Charlottetown Business College. THE Bank of Nova Scotia has sent to the shareholders a circular calling for subscriptions for six hundred shares of the additional stock issue authorized in January last. The subscription price is \$265, an advance of five points over the January price. The paid up capital is now \$2,340,400, and the new issue will bring it up to \$2,400,000.

A HALIFAX despatch says that the schooner Ripple on a trading voyage from P. E. Island is reported burned at Jeddore. About 300 barrels of potatoes in her hold were destroyed, and her captain reported that he lost \$400 in cash, the amount received from sales of produce. The vessel was insured for \$600. The Ripple was a small vessel of 20 tons, owned by Isadore Doudrot of Petit de Grand. She was built in 1884.

The report states that five years' very successful experience is equal to a college degree. Three years, successful experience is equal to a Normal School training. Efficiency shall be expressed in percentages on, (1) ability as disciplinarian, (2) knowledge of subject matter, (3) Method and manner of presenting a lesson (4) moral influence over pupils, (5) professional interest and zeal.

THE Cape Breton Steamship Co., owners of the S. S. Baines Hawkins did not purchase the steamer Hilda, which was offered for sale at auction in Halifax the other day, as the price was out of the question. It is learned, however, that some members of the company, with outsiders have in view the construction in England of a large 5,000 or 7,000 ton steamer for the coal carrying trade. A member of the company, while in conversation with The Record this morning, expressed his opinion that the shipping business was the most profitable one to engage in if the necessary capital could be secured. The members of the Cape Breton Steamship Co. realize this, and intend to make every effort in the line of progress.—Sydney Record.
