**PLANE GROUNDED AT MONCTON**—The Moncton-Charlottetown Canadian Airways mail and passenger plane was grounded at Moncton because of freezing rain. Mr. Walter Fowler, superintendent of the service, said last night. The plane was forced to return to Summerside when it met with freezing rain and fog over the Northumberland Strait on the noon crossing yesterday. Two hours later the weather cleared and the machine continued its flight to Moncton where it landed at 4.30, two and a half hours late. Before the plane took off on the return flight freezing rain again began to fall and air officials cancelled the trip. If weather conditions permit, flights will be made to the Magdalen Islands today, Mr. Fowler said.

battled their way into northern Guadalupe Province.  
The big push by Franco's troops engulfed three villages—Casteljon de Henares, Mirabueno and Adellena—and drove against Almadrones, about 60 miles northeast of Madrid.  
Insurgents were said also to have improved positions east of the Jarama River, southeast of Madrid, despite light government artillery and rifle fire.  
As Franco's troops splashed through the mud, Government militiamen on the Guadalupe front were reported by insurgents to have shouted promises to withhold their fire if the attacking riflemen would do likewise.  
Deserters from Government troops were quoted by the insurgent authorities as saying a food shortage among Madrid's defenders was increasing.  
Insurgent officers declared the Madrid defence junta intended to "sacrifice" several contingents of militiamen in defence of the capital but that hunger might cause the "suicide brigade" to mutiny and flee under attack.

MRS. MCSWAIN DIES AT 104

There passed away in the early hours of Friday morning, March 5th at the home of her nephew Mr. Allan MacSwain, Lorne Valley, Mrs. Mary MacSwain (Mary Munro) at the advanced age of 104 years and almost 10 months. Mrs. MacSwain was born in Scotland on May 10, 1832 coming to this province at a very early age. Later she married Captain James MacSwain who she accompanied on several ocean voyages. Her husband predeceased her 70 years ago. She was familiarly known by her friends and acquaintances as "Aunt Mary".  
Throughout her long life, she had enjoyed perfect health and was in command of all her faculties to the time of her death. Only shortly after celebrating her 104th birthday last May did she tell some of her friends she would enjoy an airplane ride.  
She had taken for her guide in life her Gaelic Bible which she implored daily up till the time of her death.

There was a large attendance of friends and neighbours at the funeral of Mrs. Mary MacSwain which was held on Saturday, March 6th at 11 a. m. from the residence of her nephew Mr. Allan MacSwain, Lorne Valley.  
The funeral service which was held at the house, was conducted by the Rev. T. O. Hughes, who spoke in touching terms of the Christian faith of the aged departed sister. The hymns sung were: The Lord's My Shepherd and Lead Kindly Light. The pall bearers were Messrs. Reuben MacCannell, Walker Shaw, Amram Crawford, Dan R. MacSwain, Dan J. MacArthur and Alex MacIntyre. conditions on United States lines operating in Canada and protesting against "discrimination" against employees of Canadian railways. Copies of these resolutions have been sent to the Prime Minister, the Minister of Labor and the Minister of Transport.  
Most of these resolutions, it was said, pointed to the wage restoration effected in July 1935 on Canadian railway properties of United States railways, while Canadian rates were continued under the same rates as were about 10 per cent higher on Canadian lines.

**IN MEMORIAM**

**MR. JOHN LEMUEL MacLEOD**

The death of John Lemuel MacLeod, late of Charlottetown, occurred Wednesday, March 3rd, at the home of his sister Mrs. G. W. Profit of Spring Valley after a long and continued illness which he contracted in the Canadian West about fifteen years ago. Last August when his wife was seriously ill in the P.E. Island Hospital he came to live with his brother, Mr. W. C. MacLeod, Kensington, and later went to spend the winter with his sister, Mrs. Profit, where he suddenly passed away. He leaves to mourn his widow, nee Miss Margaret Sellar of Charlottetown, who tenderly and patiently cared for him these many years until laid aside through ill health on account of which she was unable to attend the funeral of her late husband.  
Deceased was the eldest son of the late Andrew and Mrs. MacLeod of French River. Possessed in early life with a robust physique and splendid personality he gave promise of a bright business career. Graduating from Charlottetown Business College with high honors at the age of eighteen he entered the employ of P. Tappin & Co., Kensington, at that time one of the leading firms in the province, as book-keeper. Here he won for himself the popularity and high esteem of a wide circle of friends.  
About the year 1900 he headed the clarion call "Go West, young man" where he entered into business for himself and located first at Kisby and Arco, Saskatchewan, and finally at Vancouver, B. C., where he established a large and successful business until he was stricken with a paralysis which resulted in his death at the age of sixty years.  
Besides his widow he left to mourn, one brother, W. C. MacLeod and two sisters, Mrs. G. W. Profit and Mrs. D. A. Wedlock. One brother Bruce MacLeod and two sisters, Mrs. Lewis Taylor and Miss Ella MacLeod, predeceased him.  
The funeral which took place Friday afternoon was largely attended. Rev. B. C. Salter, who conducted the services, delivered a very appropriate address from Rev. Chap. 7 verse 14: These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Mr. Roscoe Walker, Kensington, sang with fine effect "Shadows". Hymns were: "The Lord's My Shepherd", and "Peace, Perfect Peace". The floral tributes included wreath from the Masonic Brethren, St. John No. 1 A.F.A.M., Charlottetown, and boards of the MacLeod House, Charlottetown.  
Undertakers Percy L. Bowness & Son conducted the funeral cortege with the following pallbearers: Messrs. Everett MacLeod, Nelson Paynter, Ernest McNeill, Hedley Paynter, George McCoubrey and Leslie Paynter. Interment took place at the Geddie Memorial cemetery, New London, in the
