St. Paul's Church S'ide Reconstructed As Parish Centre

The parishioners of St. Paul's Parish, Summerside, who have been attending Sunday service in the Capitol Theatre since the destruction of their church by fire on February 2nd will be able to attend midnight Christmas Eve in the reconstructed church building. This was announced at the services yesterday by Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. McLellan, pastor of St. Paul's.

Work has been rushed on the auditorium to have it ready for Christmas but the other floors will not be completed for some time. The work is being done by M.P. Schurman Co. Ltd. and they have made remarkable progress, notwithstanding the many shortages of materials. The floor cannot be laid for some months till the cement floor is completely dried out and the heating will be of a temporary nature for some time. Also the proper lighting fixtures will not be installed for the opening. The auditorium will have a seating capacity of over seven hundred.

Msgr. McLellan yesterday expressed the appreciation of the congregation to Mr. Harold E. Gaudet, proprietor of the Capitol Theatre for giving its use for services. He said the offer had been made while the church was burning and immediately solved their most pressing problem. He hopes that the members of the parish would never forget his generosity.

Canada's who have been winter visitors to south Florida will remember the coconut palms growing at all sorts of odd angles along the shores and keys. These palms are not natives of that state, but were planted long ago when a ship, laden with coconuts, was hopelessly wrecked and its cargo floated ashore. It is a seashore palm widely distributed throughout the tropics. Its seed, the coconut of commerce, floats readily, and protected by fibrous tissues, is not harmed by salt water. "Coconuts" is the Portuguese word for monkey, and the nuts with their "eyes" at one end, suggest rather strikingly the head of a monkey. Many bluebirds return unerringly to the same box-nests after wintering amid the waving palms of the warmer regions. This has been established by Alfred Bunker, Ontario naturalist, who year after year has leg-banded the bluebirds which occupy boxes he has placed in his orchard.
