## BRITISH GUIANA

### Delegates Want Better Trade Relations.

## LAURIER ENTERTAINS

### Them and They Visit Lord Minto—A Quebec Village Burned Out.

OTTAWA, June 26.—(Special)—Sir Cavendish Boyle and J. H. De George, of British Guiana are here to talk over better trade relations.

These delegates were accredited by Guiana to treat with the United States for reciprocity and came from Washington.

They were met by Sir Wilfrid Laurier on their arrival in Ottawa and afterwards went to Rideau Hall to meet the Governor General.

They had a conference with the government today and were afterwards entertained by Sir Wilfrid.

QUEBEC, June 26.—The village of St. Raymond was almost wiped out by fire today. Between 35 and 40 buildings were burned, and the convent seriously damaged.

Assistance was summoned from Quebec and a fire engine sent out by special train, which rendered great assistance. The loss is placed at about \$50,000; well insured.

## ST. PETER'S SCHOOLS

### Closing Exercises Held Last Night.

## ELOQUENT ADDRESSES

### An Interesting Programme—The Prizes Distributed by the Bishop.

St. Peter's Schools closed on Friday; the prizes were distributed last night, when St. Peter's Hall was filled by the parents and friends of the pupils and ladies and gentlemen interested in education.

The Hon. the Master of the Rolls, reported as to the work of the boys under his charge, and in the course of his address stated that he was glad to be able to say that he could trust implicitly in the honor of the boys.

Hon. F. St. C. Brecken, contrasted the school system of today with that of his boyhood, the contrast being vastly in favor of the present system.

The Bishop took up the same subject in his most admirable and profitable address, full of good counsel, and of characteristic eloquence. The past record of the high excellence of the schools was mentioned by the several speakers, and the Bishop expressed the wish that every parish of the diocese could boast of schools doing work of the high standard of St. Peter's.

Between the addresses the children sang selections under the leadership of Rev. T. H. Hunt, the Head Master, and Miss Ethel MacLean read the selection for which she was awarded Sir Louis Davies' special prize. The evening was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.
