Cowley Scores Two Goals As Bruins Blank Maroons 3-0; Chihawks Topple Canucks 5-

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Dec. 29—Bill Cowley, former Halifax Wolverine, fired a brace of unassisted goals in 10 seconds of the first period tonight and started Boston Bruins off toward a 3-0 win over Montreal Maroons...

Their win put them even with the champion Detroit Red Wings in the United States section second place. Before the game, Maroons and Bruins agreed to forfeit \$1,000 if they did not pay open hockey. Two Boston newspapers were agreed to as judges.

Cowley's pair of opening goals came late in the third period after Maroons had enjoyed the better of the early play. For the first he ploughed through four Maroons to top the puck into the left corner behind Alex Connell after snatching it from Jerry Shannon.

Right after the face-off, the slim centre slipped home Ray Gettiffe's rebound for his second marker. But Cook put the Bruins three up early in the next period as he speared the puck from Stu Evans near the Montreal net and slipped it neatly into the net.

Boston was never threatened after that and they Thompson had little trouble holding off Maroons for his second shutout of the season.

HAWKS HIT STRIDE
CHICAGO, Dec. 29—(AP)—Flashing a high powered offence for the first time this season, the Chicago Black Hawks scored in every period tonight to rout the last-travelling Montreal Canadiens 5-1 tonight in a National Hockey League battle before 6,500 fans.

Making a furious attack their defence, Chicago outplayed the Flying Frenchmen almost from start to finish to win their third game in 8 starts and their first victory over the Canadiens.

Earl Seibert and Johnny Gottselig paced the Hawk attack, each getting a goal and one assist.

In the final stanza the Chicagoans pushed in three markers as Toe Blake was scoring on Haynes' pass to avert a shutout for the Canadian division leaders, who lost a chance to stay on top of both divisions as the Rangers were whipping the Americans.

Brydson scored first for the Hawks, beating Cude in the opening period. In the second, Seibert scored on a great solo dash, getting by Miller to beat Cude on a backhand. Thompson tallied on Cook's pass early in the third and Blake followed with the lone Montreal marker. Kendall then beat Cude with help from Seibert, and Gottselig tallied the final goal on Cook's perfect relay.

"KEEP PUNCHING"
MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Dec. 29—(CP)—The young New York Rangers and the "keep punching" Americans swapped enough punches in a second-period outburst tonight to bring on seven penalties before Rangers went on to win 5-1 and stretch their National Hockey League sectional leadership to 3 points.

The Rangers rallied in sensational fashion during the last half of the game to come from behind and score the impressive victory before a crowd of 5,642 persons.

It was the third meeting between the tense rivals of Manhattan, with each holding a victory in the previous engagements and it was marked by some of the roughest hockey seen in Madison Square Garden in the last five years.

Americans were leading 1-0 on a goal by Tommy Anderson in the last two minutes of the first period when the game developed into a Donnybrook half way through the second chapter.

Frank Boucher, gentlemanly Ranger centre, and Hal Cotton coiled against the boards to start the fireworks. Before they were separated three other fistic jousts were in full swing.

Boucher and Cotton were given major sentences of five minutes. Allan Shields, husky American defenceman, earned a misconduct penalty that kept him on the bench for the balance of the game for arguing with Referee Bill Stewart.

Babe Pratt and Lynn Patrick of Rangers and Teddy Graham and Hap Emms of the losers were given 10 minute misconduct penalties for their part in the fueding.

After the fistic entertainment died down Rangers went to work and knotted the score on Elich Keeling's goal while Americans were two men shy and Rangers one.

The Americans collapsed completely in the last period as the victorious blueshirts slammed in four goals, two by Keeling, one by Cecil Dillon and the other by Mac Colville.

Red Wings Win From Canadiens

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Dec. 29—Wembley Lions, one of the best amateur hockey teams in the world by any measure, are skating towards their second straight title in England's National League. Stronger than ever, the Lions dominate the British hockey picture.

With Wembley rink packed for virtually every home game of the Lions, the club has won 14 of its first 18 scheduled games. Earls Court Rangers and Harringay Racers are the only teams regarded as serious challengers for the league title. Both have brilliant records.

But the Lions are supreme and Canadian critics who have seen the team are unanimous in calling it an exceptionally powerful outfit. It has the best goaltender, the best defence and some of the best forwards in England. Like other strong teams, it's all-Canadian.

Roy Musgrove of Winnipeg, playing his first season in the fast-growing 11-team circuit, has established himself as the outstanding netman in England. He allowed only 37 goals in 18 games while his team were scoring 78 and losing only three engagements.

First-string defence is made up of Lou Bates and Des Smith, both of Ottawa. Smith is held by most critics to be the best defenceman in the league. The 22-year-old Ottawa husky may lose a few of his 185 pounds recovering from an ailing period but the Lions expect him back in the struggle within a few weeks.

Cam Shewan and veteran Gordon Dalley of Winnipeg make up the second defence. Dalley has played in England five years and was vice-captain of the British team that won the Olympic championship this year. When he recovers from effects of a broken collar-bone, the 200-pound Shewan is expected to add considerable punch.

Highest-scoring front line is made up of the flying French Canadian brothers from Winnipeg, Albert and Tony Lemay, and Bob Walton of Ottawa. Other forwards are Alex Archer of Winnipeg, Jo Jo Grabowski of Ottawa, Ont., Jack Kilpatrick of Prince Albert, Sask. and Eddie Murphy of Ottawa.

Kelly, curly-haired speedster from North Bay, Ont., was signed by Smythe in the fall of 1934 with two of his St. Michael's College forward-line mates. Art Jackson and Nick Metz. Smythe made no bones about his hope that the youngsters would make good together.

A few years earlier he had sent out Charlie Conacher, Harvey Jackson and Joe Primeau and these young men had developed into one of hockey's greatest scoring divisions. But it was apparent from the start of the new venture that the miracle wasn't to be repeated.
