Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. Applicant must not own or have an interest in any Dominion Lands Agency land in any of the above provinces. The area of cultivation is a good stand may be exempt a quarter-section on alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties Six months residence in each of three years after certifying homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has enhanced his homestead right may take a purchased homestead, and in certain districts may take a purchased homestead, and in certain districts a year of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a dwelling.

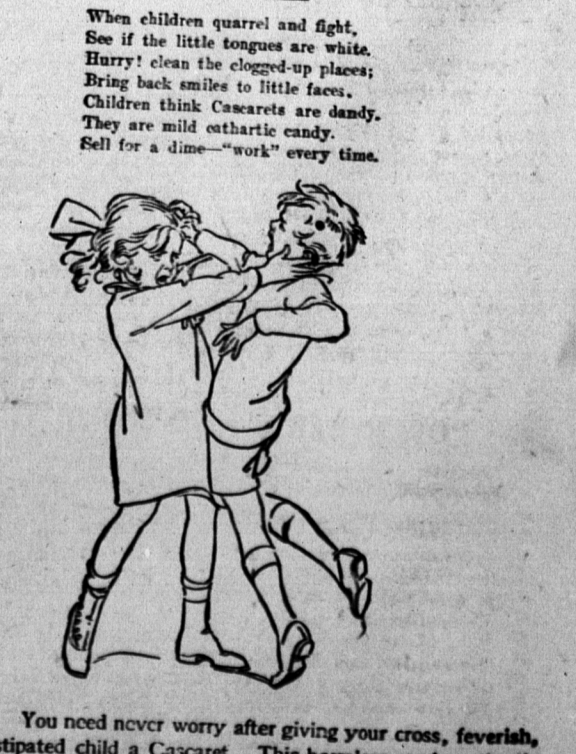
