PENSION ACT IS TO BE AMENDED

TO PUT INTO EFFECT COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

OTTAWA, May 19.—The Government has given notice by resolution of legislation to amend the Pension Act to bring into effect the recommendations of the special Parliamentary Committee on Pensions and Returned Soldiers' Problems which reported to the House of Commons on May 14.

The amending legislation will also provide for "the salaries to be paid to the Chairman and members of the Pension Tribunal, the President and members of the Pension Appeal Court, and for Pension to be granted to any member of the said bodies, or of the Commission on retirement; and for the salaries of the other proposed officials and travelling and living expenses as prescribed; and for the constitution of a branch of the Department to be known as the Veterans' Bureau.

## "FAKE MESSAGE" FAILS TO LURE NAIRN FROM JOB

FREDERICTON, N. B., May 19.—Something new in strategy in battling for hockey players' services bobbed up during the week-end when Joe Nairn, flashy forward player from Stellarton, N. S., received a telegram from Stellarton telling him to hurry home as his wife was seriously ill. Joe was naturally much upset by the news, but at the suggestion of Fredericton Hockey Club officers, called up his home by phone only to find that his wife was not ill and that it was merely the move of heartless hockey promoters in Stellarton, who wanted to scare their star player away from Fredericton. The net result is that Mrs. Nairn will soon move to Fredericton to join Joe who is happy here and says he has the best job he ever had.

## MAN CHARGED WITH ATTEMPT TO WRECK MARITIME EXPRESS

ACCUSED IS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL AT JACQUET RIVER HEARING

CAMPBELLTON, May 19.—Charged with an attempt to wreck the C. N. R. Maritime express at a point some two miles west of Jacquet River, Restigouche county, on the night of May 11, David Levesque, aged 18, of Jacquet River, was committed for trial by Magistrate Daniel McAlister there. The evidence submitted by the Crown, represented by J. Allen LeBlanc, of Campbellton, was to the effect that the accused had on the night in question placed a keg of nails on the tracks prior to the approach of the Maritime. Authorities state that had the train struck the obstruction there would likely have been a derailment. Evidence secured by Special Agent Harry J. Culligan, of Campbellton, resulted in a warrant being sworn out and Levesque was arrested the following day and remanded. The accused, who pleaded not guilty, was not represented by counsel.

## TWO BERGS FRIGHTEN STEAMER PASSENGERS

BOSTON, May 19.—A genuine scare was thrown into the passengers of the North German Lloyd liner Karlsruhe when on the night of May 11, after the liner had battled a terrific gale all night, they awoke to find two monster icebergs only a short distance from the ship. When the liner docked here on May 6, Captain Filzinger reported to the local United States Hydrographic Office that the bergs were sighted between the Flemish Cape and the east coast of Newfoundland during the trip from Bremen, Galway, Halifax to Boston and New York. The captain said that owing to a delay in leaving Bremen he had taken the shortest route across the Atlantic. The night of May 1, off the Grand Banks of Newfoundland, he encountered a terrific gale, with which his ship was forced to battle 12 hours against high seas as well. The following morning two icebergs were sighted, one of enormous size, which towered over the stacks of the ship and only a short distance away, he said. Captain Filzinger declared it an act of Providence that the heavy fog which settled down five hours after passing the bergs, had not been in the vicinity of the ice, for it was in the direct path of the liner.

## FEWER BERGS

over to the Modoc on Thursday morning we knew of only three bergs in this locality. "On April 22, we picked up a berg in 44-06 north, 49-02 west, in the Labrador current east of the Banks and visited this berg nearly every day until we left the patrol. It travelled about 17 miles each day while east of the Banks, but on arriving at the Tail it seemed to get in an eddy, and remained practically stationary for several days, then started to the southward and later on to the east-ward and between April 30th and May 4th it had travelled 160 miles until it was in 49-34 west on the "B" track of steamers between New York and European ports. "The patrol vessel was near this berg for days at a time to warn vessels east and west bound on this track of the presence of this berg as it was a great menace to navigation especially as it was in a narrow cold stream with temperatures of from 38 to 42 degrees whereas a very short distance away the Gulf stream was 57 degrees. The prevailing southerly winds blowing over the warmer water onto the "cold wall" produced fog around the berg most of the time. "On arriving in the above position this berg discontinued its travel and remained practically stationary where it is rapidly disintegrating. This berg is mentioned as of interest as on an average only one berg in every four years comes south of the 40th parallel, but in very rare cases a berg has been known to cross the Gulf Stream and be seen near Bermuda or the Azores. "The other two bergs which have travelled to the Tail of the Banks were picked up on April 22nd in 44-03 north, 48-37 west, which is east of the Banks about seventy miles north of the Tail. This pair of bergs when picked up were about 400 feet long and 100 feet high, which is considered very large bergs in this latitude. They were about 14 miles apart. While coming south in the Labrador current they travelled 22 miles each day, but strange to say on arriving at 42-46 north, 49-46 west on May 1st they did not follow the course of the first berg mentioned, to the steamship tracks, but have gone to the eastward and will probably take a northeasterly course which will keep them out of the steamship lanes. "The Canadian Ice Patrol vessels during this period have encountered some field ice in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, but there was no flat ice sighted, and none was reported to the Modoc from the region above the Grand Banks. Icebergs were slightly below normal in numbers between the 45th and 49th parallels. Between these latitudes, also, they are beginning to drift south on the average considerably further to the westward, a number of bergs being reported from between the 49th meridian and St. John's, Newfoundland. This is a very favorable sign, indicating that in all probability the supply of bergs for the cold current along the eastern edge of the Grand Banks may fall at an early date, due to the bergs stopping and melting in the shoal waters between Cape Race and 47-30 north, 49-00 west. "Only six different bergs were sighted or reported south of the 45th parallel. This is a number decidedly less than the average. None of these southernmost bergs drifted to the westward past 50-10 west, because a current of warm Gulf stream water extended north-wardward almost to the Tail throughout the cruise. "There were a few hours of gales on three different days but in general the weather was more moderate than on any patrol cruise so far this year. "To illustrate how vessels like to co-operate with the ice patrol vessels so that the efficiency of the patrol can be carried on to the highest standard we received 87 reports of ice from 64 ships, and 1021 water temperatures from vessels passing through the patrol area to assist us in making current charts. We send out ice broadcasts twice in the morning and twice at night, and furnish 25 vessels with special reports on ice conditions."

## CHRISTIANITY

"We need a sovereign God who is bigger than environment and who is bigger than heredity. We are great on theories," said he, "and shy on power." The speaker paid a high tribute to the League of Nations, but said, however, that he would have more confidence in the League when it placed the emphasis on Jerusalem rather than Geneva. In this connection, he stressed the principles of Jesus as being those by which the League will succeed. Dr. Poole made frequent reference to the place power occupies in the New Testament and stated that in everyone of the twenty-seven books of the New Testament the sense of power is everywhere in evidence. He condemned the old adage: "When in Rome do as the Romans do" and stated that one does not have to do as "the Romans do, but rather carry your Antioch and Corinth experiences into Rome and change Rome." "Paul was not appalled at the splendor of Rome, but said: 'I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, for it is the power of God unto Salvation.' In speaking of world conditions at the advent of Christ, Dr. Poole stated that "Christianity came into a world extraordinarily like the world in which we now live. "The world in the first century was war weary; the world today is war weary. The first century was an age in which people were breaking away from the past. The cults of today were found in some form and under some name in the first century. If Christianity was able to achieve such magnificent triumphs in the first century, so it is able to achieve great triumphs in this age." In conclusion, Dr. Poole stated that the highest expression of power is in personality. The radiance of power is so powerful that it has a speed equalling that of light, 182,000 miles per second, and is the most powerful substance known, the speaker maintained that the weakest man or woman in the church could generate more power, regardless of social status, affluence, or poverty. "Power in personality expresses itself in two ways, the power to aspire and the power to achieve. To as many as received Him, to them gave He the power to become the sons of God." The speaker's concluding words eloquently and forcefully stressed the ultimate power and triumph of Christ as "The Captain of our salvation."

## RUMORS OF CABINET CHANGES STILL ACTIVE AROUND FEDERAL CAPITAL

King, Minister of Pensions and National Health, may decide to accept the British Columbia vacancy in the Senate. It is understood all the ministers are going ahead making preparations for their own nominations in the ridings they now represent. The past week also brought no light as to who will fill the vacancies in the Senate for the provinces of Quebec or Prince Edward Island.
