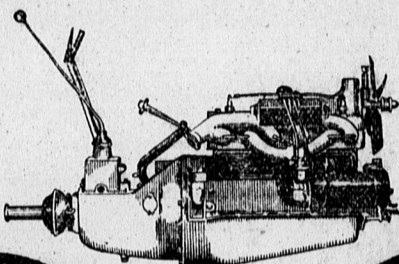

and that the choir should render an anthem in his memory." The late Mr. Gorbell was a native of Moncton, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred J. Gorbell, who are both living. He was educated in the Moncton schools and for some years was proprietor of a dry goods store later removing to Halifax where he became Y. M. C. A. boys' work secretary. He continued in this position about five years. For about two years he was general secretary of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A. Returning to Moncton in 1922, he had since officiated as general secretary of the local organization. Mr. Gorbell was a prominent member of Wesley Memorial Church and was leader of the choir. He was also a member of the Knights of Pythias Order.

was taken in it at the time by both Unionists and Presbyterians as it was seen that the case embodied the principles that were the causes of controversy in the church union question.

Briefly the facts of the case are these. A number of Ruthenians formed a socialist club called the Brosvita Society of Ukrainians. They got along very well and increased in numbers. Then a party arose within the club which was dissatisfied with the original creed of the club. It was out of date, and they wanted something more up to the minute. So they began to inculcate Bolshevistic and revolutionary doctrines which the others did not approve. Soon they were in the majority and on the grounds that (if not as some people contend that "majorities are of God") well, the majority must prevail, no matter what the constitution may say.

Those opposed to these changes were given the option of agreeing with these changes or getting put out of the club. As they would not agree, out they were put and the "majority" took over the property. The minority brought suit and in the decision recently given it is shown that "majorities" do not rule when they go contrary to the constitution of the organization to which they belong. (Your readers might think when they read this, that I am referring to the Presbyterian church and what is happening in it. No, no. All this happened in a Ruthenian club west. I admit there is a wonderful similarity.) The legal decision was given in Toronto at Osgoode Hall by Mr. Justice Kelly, and was printed as a press dispatch in the Montreal Star of last Saturday, March 22nd. Judgment was in favor of the original adherents of the society.

"His lordship holds that the name of the society cannot be changed and that the property and assets cannot be diverted from the original purpose of the society without the consent of the original members. He holds also that the original members, many of whom were excluded from membership by the newcomers are entitled to retain their membership. The revolutionary element is restrained from using the property and assets for other purposes than those contemplated by the constitution as it stood prior to the attempted change. The defendants are further restrained from alienating the property.

That is the law of Canada in this very month and year, not the law of another land in a bygone age. It shows that a society cannot change its name, doctrines, organization or misuse its property at the whim of a mere majority vote unless it is explicitly so provided in its constitution. The proposed bill plainly aims at circumventing the law of the land. Justice is blind and deaf. She cannot distinguish between the clean shaven cleric and the much bewhiskered revolutionary; she cannot hear the intimidations of an Assembly leader that "he would like to see the government that would refuse to pass this bill" no more than she can hear the threatenings and the slanders of a Moscow or Port Arthur "Red". Without fear or favour her decisions are given and any men, organizations or even legislatures, who by subterfuge or by special or class legislation have ignored them or set them at naught have only paved the way for future injustices and oppressions. Any student of history and legislation can bear witness to this fact. Psalm 94 verse 20 is worthy of the consideration of the promoters and supporters of this bill.

"Shall the throne of wickedness have fellowship with thee which frameth mischief by statute?" I am, Sir, etc
