THE STANLEY.—The Stanley docked in Pictou yesterday at 10.35 a. m., with ninety-five tons freight, sixty sacks of mail and fifteen passengers.

THE MINTO.—The Minto docked at Georgetown at 10.05 yesterday morning with forty-nine tons freight, 120 sacks mail and thirty-three passengers.

ICE RACES SATURDAY.—Ice races will be held on the Pinette ice on Saturday next, Jan. 9th in the afternoon. Classes and purses will be arranged for at the meet and all horsemen are invited to enter.

ICE BUSHED.—The harbor ice from West Street to Rocky Point has been bushed and quite a number of teams were crossing by that route yesterday. A depth of one foot of ice is reported in the channel.

POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court yesterday morning Edgar McCarron appeared before His Honor Mr. K. J. Martin, S. M., charged with drunkenness. He was convicted and fined \$30 or 90 days.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—The Guardian regrets to learn that Mr. Wm. Smith, an elderly resident of Morel Road, had the misfortune to slip and fall at the church door on Sunday last, breaking his leg. Dr. Walsh was summoned to set the limb.

HER MANY FRIENDS will regret to learn that Mrs. J. J. McDonald, St. Andrew's, is at present suffering with pneumonia. Dr. Walsh is in attendance, and her friends wish that under his skilful treatment she may speedily recover.

ENGAGEMENT ANNOUNCED.—Dr. and Mrs. John T. Cosgrove of Wellington, P. E. I., announce the engagement of their youngest daughter, Miss Edith J., a graduate nurse of the Brockton Hospital training school, to Dr. J. J. Condrich, a young practicing physician of Brockton, Mass. The marriage to take place early in February.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—Mr. John Heron, Mt. Stewart, met with a rather painful accident on Sunday, Dec. 27th. While walking down the street, he slipped on an icy spot on the sidewalk and fell, breaking his wrist. Medical aid was quickly summoned and the bone was set. It is doing nicely, and his friends hope to see Mr. Heron able to work soon.

EXCELSIOR FARMERS' INSTITUTE.—The annual meeting for the election of officers for the Excelsior Farmers' Institute of York, was held in the hall on the evening of Dec. 26, when the following were elected: President, Capt. H. J. Vice-pres., Hon. J. Mellet; Secty., R. L. Day; Treasurer, E. J. Vessey; with a good working committee. The retiring secretary gave the financial report, which was very satisfactory for the amount of business done. The retiring president, P. Brodie, gave a synopsis of the work of the Institute for the past year. He started out by saying that the crops throughout the country were above the average for the past year, and the farmers of this Institute had a good average if not their full share of these crops. The hay crop was fully up to the average if not a little better, the wheat being the best in twenty years. All the other crops were good with the exception of a few fields of turnips, which were badly affected with club-root. He then gave an estimate of the business done through the Institute. Over \$7,200 worth of pork, over \$5,400 worth of beef cattle and over \$1,000 worth of dairy cattle were sold. As there were only 104 tons of hay sold it shows that farmers are feeding it nearly all at home. The dairymen have had a successful year, especially those who had green feed during the month of September and October. As he had not got the Factory Report, he could not give the full amounts, but there are two of the leading farmers who, between them, have taken nearly \$1,500. The Egg Circle has only been working nine months, and a number have not joined it yet, as they had customers in the city whom they had promised to supply. However, \$1,965.76 was taken from Feb. 1st to the last of October, one of the members taking \$219.47. Three others passed the \$150 mark each. It is hoped to see all the members of the Institute in the Circle, the coming year as the egg industry, instead of only being a side line in farming, has come to be one of its main assets. This Institute has also won at the various exhibitions and seed fairs during 1914, the creditable amount of over \$1,200. The Institute purchased 42 tons of bran, 9 tons of cake, 3 tons cotton seed meal for feed, also over \$500 worth of seeds from a firm in Ont., and over \$600 worth from the merchants of our own Province. The Institute was pleased with the attendance during the year as the average per night was over twenty. The members listened to a number of good addresses from experts in farming which were very much appreciated. The annual supper was a big success. There is a fine staff of officers for the coming year, and it is hoped to see the attendance double what it was last year. It was agreed by the Institute to meet every Saturday night, the programme for the next two nights being Jan. 2nd, a paper on the production of eggs by Mr. B. R. Brown, Jan. 9th, a paper on plowing and soil cultivation by Mr. P. Brodie. Wishing all the members of the Institute a happy and prosperous New Year.—Com.

OUTDOOR RINK.—The boys of Victoria have for the past few days been building an outdoor rink on the harbor and are counting on a good time during the coming winter. Some of the older hockey players are having a hard time to keep pace with some of the "young uns" who are doing their best to make things interesting for them.

A SAD FATALITY.—One of the saddest events in the history of the community occurred at the home of Mr. John Reynolds of Point Pleasant, Murray Harbor North, on Saturday evening, Jan. 2nd, when his little daughter Maggie Florence was so severely burned as to cause her death within a few hours. After returning from the store in the early evening the child filled the lamps, when she likely spilled some of the oil upon her clothes, for immediately afterwards, while attending to a fire in an upstairs stove the flames caught her dress. Within a few seconds her brother-in-law who ran to her rescue, had succeeded in smothering the fire which encircled her; but in those few

seconds she had become so badly burned as to be beyond human help. Dr. Brehaut of Murray River was quickly at the place of the accident; but there was nothing that could be done except afford temporary relief from pain, and within a few hours the little soul had passed away. That this is a particularly sad event, we all are admitted when it is noted that this is the second tragedy of this kind that has occurred in this family. Eighteen years ago this month the eldest daughter, then a child of but a few months, was burned to death. Her name was Easter May, and the memory of the gloom cast over the community at that time is still in the minds of many. Again, it was but last March that the second eldest daughter, a bride of but a short time, was called away after having given birth to a child. It was her sorrowing husband who made such a brave attempt to save the little sister whose death has now saddened the community. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon, when the services were conducted at the home and graveside by the pastor of the congregation with which the family is connected. Rev. A. Sutherland, who spoke of the deep sympathy of the whole countryside with the sorrowing family and friends, many of whom are the children of the week-day and Sunday Schools. In both of these schools "Flossie," although but ten years and seven months old, had taken an unusually large amount of interest. In the public school she was



bright and attentive to her work while at the Christmas tree, held by the Sunday School, she recited one of the most interesting pieces on the programme. The little one is gone, but her memory is still in the place she used to occupy. The sadness of her departure will long remain in the school, the church and the community.
