Of course, a strikeout is more important down here in the sticks than it would be in the big time. Three errors in a game is a lot of miscues in the National or American League, whereas the total sometimes soars to seven or eight around here without anybody getting fired for inefficiency. So if a man can send a ground ball zipping along in these parts, his chances of reaching first is much rosier than it would be in the big leagues. Your batting average may look pretty sick but if you can hit the ball fair at all, the chances are you will get at least some exercise scampering around the bases. So local pitchers, with more or less wobbly infields behind them, really go after the strikeouts.
