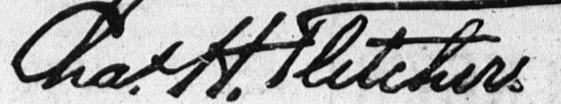

NEW LIMBS FOR WAR VICTIMS (By Jacques Boyer.) The artificial arms now being produced in the benefit of those mangled in the war are no longer merely designed to mask the loss of a member. They are ingenious mechanisms based on sound physiological considerations, devised with cunning and put together with art.

For those "amputees" who have preserved the elbow joint, an American firm constructs an artificial arm with which are possible a large variety of movements. Flexions of the wrist, opening and rotation of the "hand," placing the "fingers" in certain positions and holding them firmly there are all accomplished with no intervention of the other hand aside from engaging and disengaging of a catch.

OPEN DRAINS.—Professors L. Temar and W. Reid have spent the second week of July in Mont. Carmel directing operations in the construction of an open ditch following what should be a natural water course, but on account of lack of a definite course and outlet the water heretofore lost itself over a considerable area and only reached the brook by perennating through the soil or gradually flowing over a gentle grade, when in time of freshets. On the 10th a meeting was held in Mt. Carmel hall for the purpose of considering about other outlets. Four more outlets or open drains were arranged by those interested in each case.—R.

SPRING VALLEY SCHOOL.—The closing exercises of Spring Valley school took place on June 25th. There were twenty-five ratepayers and parents present. ONLY THE STALKS OF RHUBARB FOR USE. Several Cases of Poisoning in England from the use of Leaves as Greens. In the effort to find new sources of food supply in England the leaves of rhubarb have been cooked and served like spinach or... with the result in one instance that the consumer has died with symptoms of oxalic acid poisoning, says the New York Sun. This incident has naturally excited much newspaper comment as well as considerable alarm among householders who have not hitherto supposed that there was anything poisonous about rhubarb in any form. The discussion on the subject has brought out one point very clearly and that is that there is a marked difference between the danger to be apprehended from eating leaves and that from eating stalks. The common rhubarb used for culinary purposes is scientifically known as Rheum rhabarbarum, the generic name being derived from Rha, the ancient appellation of the Volga River, on whose banks the tender leafstalks of this variety have been employed in tarts and other preparations for he table since the beginning of the nineteenth century. "They are excellent," he says, "either stewed alone or with rice, and a capital preserve has been made from them in the form of a jam which is equal in flavor to that made from currants." In his dictionary there is no suggestion that any part of the common rhubarb plant can possibly poison a person to death. On the contrary, he tells us that in the time of Queen Elizabeth rhubarb leaves were used as a pot herb and considered superior to spinach or beet.

For Higher Grade Work. For the clerical or professional worker and the skilled artisan, there is made a much more elaborate hand.
