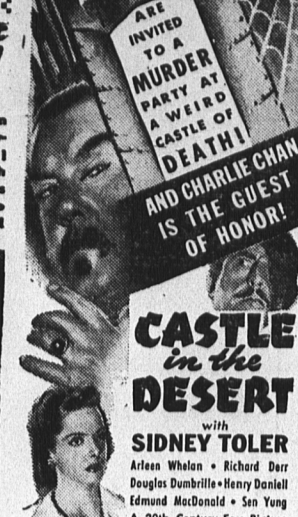

Sudden Death Yesterday of Mr. W. Warren

The sudden death of Mr. William Warren, retired Warrant Officer 1 of the Royal Canadian Regiment, which occurred at his home here last night after seven o'clock yesterday morning came as a shock to his many friends. He became ill suddenly on Monday and entered the hospital the following day. He was 64 years of age.

The late Mr. Warren, who was born in Charlottetown, devoted his entire life to the militia. After attending West Kent School he first entered the army life at the early age of 18 when he enlisted for service in the Boer War. After serving for a time in South Africa he was invalided to England and arrived back in Charlottetown a short time later. He then entered the permanent militia and made soldiering his life work. During the course of his sojourn in khaki he was stationed in various parts of Canada. In the First World War he served in England as an instructor giving valuable service to his country. He retired at the age of 45 and had his home in Charlottetown ever since.

After his retirement, the late Mr. Warren took an active part in Scout work and rendered valuable service to the organization. He acted as Scout Master, Provincial Commissioner and also was for a time Field Secretary of the Prince of Wales Association.

During the Scout's jubilee, he was presented with the Silver Acorn, one of the highest of Scout awards, for long service.

In addition to his many other interests, he was an active member of the Knights of Pythias here and was Past Chancellor Commander of the order at Fredericton, N.B., at the Charlottetown Lodge. Only Thursday night last, he attended a meeting of the order and assisted in the conferring of the rank of a former member of the Sons of England and was a devoted member of St. Paul's Anglican Church.

Survived by his wife, formerly Mrs. Ethel, of this city, also one daughter, Mrs. Hedley Stewart, Toronto, and his mother, Mrs. William McRae, Charlottetown. He is survived also by his four sisters, Lillian, Mrs. Fred Smith, Charlottetown; Miss Edith MacRae, Charlottetown; Hattie, Mrs. Amos Doucette, Un'ted Ward, Ch'pstow; and four brothers, Fred MacRae in Ontario, Wallace MacRae, Albert MacRae, and Nelson MacRae, all of Charlottetown.

The funeral will be held from St. Paul's Church Thursday afternoon, following a private service at his late residence, 19 North River Road.

Says Japs Have Idea of "Super Race"

"The Japanese people are imbued with the idea of a super race with a divine origin, and they make Japan the greatest power in Asia but also in the whole world," declared Rev. R. V. Spencer, for many years an Anglican missionary in Japan, in an inspiring address delivered in St. Paul's Hall, Charlottetown, last night. He arrived here earlier in the evening and will be in the province until Monday next.

In his address he outlined the events leading up to the point where all foreign missionaries were forced to get out of Japan because of pressure brought to bear by the militarists. He began his talk by describing conditions when he first went to Japan. This was in the days when that country had an alliance with Great Britain and welcomed British people in their midst. At that time the navy was British because most of the naval officers had been trained in Britain. However, the army was German because its officers had been trained in Germany. But the Government was more representative of the people and its sympathies rested with the British.

This condition lasted until the last few years. The change only became evident recently. After the last war, the democratic ideal gained popularity in the country. So strong was the desire for this form of government that the Crown Prince of Japan was sent to England and the United States to gain first hand knowledge of the form of rule. Further evidence was supplied in the fact that the Emperor began to desire love rather than reverence from the people.

Rev. Mr. Spencer then went on to show the growth of the militarist movement in Japan. These men desired a dominant Japanese nation and recognized that there were two great obstacles in their way. These were the United States and Great Britain and while they openly displayed friendship towards these powers, they were secretly beginning to use subtle methods of propaganda.

Used Schools

The first trend of this propaganda was to build up a nationalism. They thought that the Emperor, as the son of a Goddess, was the highest being worthy of worship. They also claimed they had a sacred mission the extent of which was unlimited.

TORONTO, May 26—(CP)—National headquarters of the Canadian Red Cross Society announced tonight that \$6,362,571 of the \$9,000,000 campaign has been subscribed.

Prince Edward Island continues to lead provincial contributions with 120 per cent of its objective attained while Alberta and Saskatchewan follow with 81 and 80 per cent, respectively. Other percentages: Nova Scotia, 78; Ontario, 76; Quebec, 74; New Brunswick, 70; Manitoba, 69; British Columbia, 59.
