A REPORT gained currency on the street last night that Kolo's trotting stallion owned by J. M. Nicholson had been sold. But the Guardian could not learn that the rumor had any foundation in fact.

The young men and boys who plan attending the Y.M.C.A. gymnasium classes this season, should join this week and get all ready for a good start, as the classes open next Monday. The classes promise to be large.

READERS of The Guardian who have been puzzled in their efforts to distinguish by their appearance the different breeds of animals competing at the Exhibition, will find the excellent photo engravings of the different types of horses, cattle, sheep, and pigs published in today's issue an invaluable guide in assisting them to recognize the breeds.

The arrival of the Dominion steamboat inspectors suddenly, yesterday, and their demand to inspect the steamer Hillsboro which is now plying on the Charlottetown and Rocky Point Ferry, was the cause of the steamer being held up during the day. Only one trip was made early in the morning and later in the day arrivals at Rocky Point were forced to return without reaching the City by ferry. A great deal of annoyance was caused and much indignation was expressed, but it is said that the visit of the inspectors was not expected and there was no time to publish any notification that the boat would be taken off the route.

The first session of the Annual Convention of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Association was held yesterday morning at the Y.M.C.A. Hall. There was a fair attendance all parts of the Province having representatives among the teachers who numbered over 100. The President of the Association, Joseph Gillis, presided, and in the course of his address drew attention to several matters. He pointed out that pupils used books which conflicted with their religious leanings and with regard to scholarship suggested that four be given each year—one to each county and two to Charlottetown. The usual routine work was transacted, and committees appointed, and Leigh Seaman was appointed Secretary during the Convention. Miss Harris, Charlottetown, delivered an interesting description of a trip abroad. At its conclusion the meeting adjourned until 9 o'clock this morning.

The fact that the Ayrshire Bull, owned by the Provincial Farm captured second prize in his class at the Exhibition, in competition with the herd of Senator Edwards, of Ontario which comprises the best animals in Canada, is a gratifying thing to know. This bull was purchased from Sir William McDonald last March, and was selected by Professor Robertson. The bull is a representative of the best milking strain in the Dominion. In pigs the Provincial Farm had some fine exhibits, but as they would have to enter into rivalry with the entries of Island farmers it was decided not to put them up for prizes. In connection with the cattle of the Provincial Farm it is pleasing to learn that the animals which were last spring found to be affected with tuberculosis have been destroyed and the buildings subjected to a thorough retreating and fumigating with sulphur. In addition to this all the places in which the stock were kept disinfected and scrubbed with corrosive sublimate solution, so that at the present time the danger of the disease is practically nil. The animals now composing the herd have all been tested and re-tested and show no sign of the disease.
