THE best evidence of an early summer yet brought to our notice was a handful of ripe strawberries which Mr. Colin Milligan of this town tempted the writer with yesterday. The berries were picked at Clifton where the fruit has been ripening since Saturday last. Anyone who can beat this with a quart or two will be gladly welcomed.

THE dry goods merchants and gents' furnishers of the city of Moncton, have agreed to close their respective stores at six o'clock each evening of the days of the week following namely, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, save and except the evenings before holidays and monthly pay days and night following in the Intercolonial Railway shops in that city. This is to go into effect to-day. Most of the cities, towns and villages throughout the provinces are making similar moves, but Summerside still drags on in the same old man-killing way.

THE funeral of the late Mrs. (Dr.) Murphy, Tignish which took place on Sunday to Alberton, is said to have been the largest ever seen in the Province. The procession was headed by the officiating clergy, followed by the members of the C. M. B. A. the hearse, then the mourners and carriages of which there were about one hundred and seventy-five teams. The procession was joined at Alberton by a large crowd of pedestrians. At the Church Rev. A. E. Burke, addressed the people thanking them for their deep sympathy shown to him and all the bereaved in the hour of their trouble.

THE regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last night, with the Mayor and all the Councillors present. After the usual routine John Crozier's tender for whitening and tinting the fire engine house for the sum of \$4.75 was accepted. The Council then discussed the proposal made by Mr. F. G. Blizzard to change the east end fire tank to the north side of the Railroad, the Town to take over the stock used, the same to be used in a new tank and he, blizzard to be allowed \$25 for building the new one. This proposal was made on account of it being found impossible to satisfactorily repair the tank recently built under contract. On motion of Councillor Dickieson, seconded by Councillor Morris, it was decided to call for tenders for the building of a new tank. Mr. Charles Muttart was granted the privilege of operating his steam riding gallery in the Town one week without special tax and he charged \$5 for every succeeding week. Some discussion took place regarding bad drainage in certain sections of the eastern part of the Town, and the police were given instructions to see that all such places be remedied at once. Councillor Rogers, moved seconded by Councillor Morris that a committee be appointed to wait upon the Superintendent of the railway with a view of coming to some arrangements about draining and macadamising, Water Street along side the freight house, and also the placing of planks between the rails at the different crossings for the accommodation of pedestrians. The matter of opening a street below Granville Street to the People's Cemetery was brought up and a committee appointed to inquire into the cost. Councillor Morris spoke of the necessity of a fire tank at the extreme north end of the Town. After some informal discussion the Council adjourned.
