Germany May Issue Food Cards
BERLIN, via London, Nov. 10.—National Liberal members of the Reichstag, at a conference in Eisenach, passed resolutions declaring that counter-action in the form of bread cards was the most important task in home politics. The resolutions said the action already taken was insufficient, and that other measures for enforcing economy, like the introduction of meat rationing, and that means must be adopted, and that means must be found to supply peasant stock growers with foodstuffs.

Ammunition Hidden In Africa

LONDON, Nov. 11.—A despatch to The Times from Capetown, asserts that Henry Burton, Minister of Railways of the Union of South Africa, declared in a speech at Natal, that huge quantities of ammunition had been discovered hidden in Damaraland, Southwest Africa. The Minister said there was sufficient ammunition to equip sixty thousand men and that the Germans had hoped to overthrow the government of the Union of South Africa with the aid of a rebellion.

Siege Battery's New Quarters


The Battery's new quarters in the Agricultural building are now in good working order, and the men are feeling very much at home. In the way of facilities for cleanliness there is nothing lacking. The newly completed bathroom on the ground floor gives accommodation for half a dozen or more shower baths at one time. The lavatory is fitted with a number of the latest self-flushing tanks. The men receive instruction in the working of the three 4.9 guns which stand in the main body of the hall during the specified hours in the forenoon and afternoon. A squad of men is taken at a time and the officers put them through their instruction in gunnery, such as limbering and unlimbering, range finding, etc., and explain the mechanism and its working. The men evince a keen interest in this work and go through the various movements with all the unity and precision possible.

The walls in all the sleeping quarters are lined with hooks all round on which the men's great coats, belts, etc., are hung. Sheathed and panelled in white varnished beaver-board the walls and roofs present a fine, clean, bright appearance. Altogether the sleeping quarters are very comfortable.

In the way of amusement the men generally have some cheerful entertainment in the way of sing-songs during the wet evenings in the main body of the big hall. The narrow, raised platform running along the front of the entrance does duty as a stage, while the boys sit around in a big circle. Some fine talent is rapidly being developed. The piano is a great acquisition and is much appreciated. The regular standing orders of the day are as follows, and these show that a fairly arduous programme of work is adhered to:
