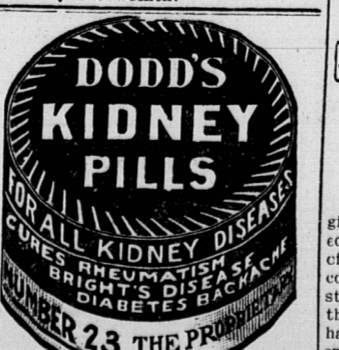

SHOULD BE PAID SAME WAGE AS MEN

LONDON, April 8—That women should be paid the same wages as men for the same work was demanded by the member from Norwich at a recent debate in the House of Commons in connection with a proposed alteration of the fair wages clause to conform with trade union principles. The fair wage resolution was moved by John Hodge (Lanes, Gorton), and Mr. Roberts, in seconding, said it was being put forward with the support of all branches of the Labor party, because the present clause was open to evasion by employers. "I never could understand," declared Mr. Roberts, "why it should be a tradition that women should be paid less than men for the same work."

Sydney Buxton, postmaster-general, author of the existing fair wages clause, moved an amendment from the government bench, setting forth a different emendation of the clause. This recognized the trade union standard in places where there are trade unions, but relied, "in the absence of such recognized wages and hours," on those which in practice prevail among good employers in the district. "Quite recently," he said, "we laid down a minimum rate of wages for women workers in the clothing trade. That was a novel departure, and its effect will be to double the wages received by the women."

GIANT GIRDER PLACED IN POSITION

NEW YORK, April 8—A giant steel girder with an American flag attached swung into place over the middle of the East River today marked the connection of the great steel superstructure of the Manhattan bridge, the fourth of the spans linking Manhattan Island and Long Island. The engineers' computations were found to be exact, the steel chords from the two sections of the bridge meeting to the inch as calculated. A formal opening of connection is planned for next week, Mayor McClellan to make the first trip over the new structure. Three bridges across the East River are now in use, the third, the Blackwell's Islands or Queensborough bridge of cantilever construction having been opened last week.

The Manhattan bridge, like the first Brooklyn bridge and the Williamsburg bridge is of the suspension type.

ICE COMPANY'S PLANT BURNED

EAST WATERBORO, Me., April 8—Nearly four thousand tons of ice stored in six ice-houses on the shores of Barlett River were destroyed by fire tonight which practically cleaned out the plant owned by the E. W. Clarke, Ice Company, including the half a dozen houses and an engine house. The damage is estimated at upwards of \$50,000. The fire is believed to have been incendiary although no idea of the miscreant is known by the owner.

Fanned by a high wind, the flames scattered over a broad territory and a colony of summer cottages nearby were seriously threatened. The danger was overcome, however, and the fire confined to the Ice Company's plant.
