

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency on or before the date of the opening of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 20 acres and erect a house. worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

February 4, 1917
JESUS THE SAVIOUR OF THE WORLD
(John 3:5-17.)

Golden Text—"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him, should not perish, but have everlasting life."—John 3:16.

Verses 1-2. Nicodemus was a Pharisee. Unlike the majority, however, he was an open-minded man in his search for the righteousness of God. The fact that Jesus was unconventional in his manner of life and teaching did not prevent him from thinking that he was "a teacher come from God." He was willing to hear the divine message from one whose ways were very different from those of the recognized leaders of his own party.

The fact that he came to Jesus by night betrays his consciousness of doing that which would be disapproved by his associates. He knew very well that they had always condemned Jesus as unworthy of a place among the teachers of Israel because he would not conform to their rules of conformity with outward ceremony. Nicodemus came to Jesus not with clear convictions, but with doubts and misgivings. Moreover, Nicodemus' own idea of the highest good was vague. He shared with the Pharisees the belief that a kingdom of God was impending, in which righteousness should be the law of life. But did he conceive of that righteousness as anything more than the punctilious performance of small duties like the tithing of anise, mint and cummin? We do not know. His idea of salvation was probably extremely vague, if not utterly wrong from the point of view of the modern Christian.

But though coming with misgivings and with a confused and inadequate notion of what salvation means, the fact remains that he came to Jesus with an open mind. No one ever comes to Jesus with an open mind, asking for light, without receiving as much light as he is capable of using. His party or other affiliation may be wrong, his mind may be largely fogged by prejudices, his steps may falter as he comes, and even a blush of shame may suffuse his cheek; but if he is sincere in his search he shall find the way of salvation.

Verses 3-9. What Jesus told Nicodemus regarding salvation resolves itself into three propositions. First, he said that there is a change in the person saved. It is a radical change comparable only to the beginning of a new life. "Ye must be born anew (from above)." Not only the phraseology but also the thought puzzled Nicodemus. And, familiar as the figure of speech has become through centuries of Christian preaching, the thought of the new birth still puzzles the minds of men. The modern psychologists have set themselves upon the pursuit of the solution of the problem. "How can these things be?" And it is to be thankfully acknowledged that they have secured much valuable information by their questioning and their tabulated results and their keen analytical pro-

cesses. But all they have achieved has been about the ages at which men and women awaken to the sense of spiritual reality, the concomitants and the agencies that assist in the process and other outward conditions and factors. The life that is saved by the soul is as mysterious as in the days of Nicodemus. It is still a life of the Spirit, free, inscrutable and irresistible.

Verses 10-13. The second fact that Jesus revealed to Nicodemus about salvation is that it requires the acceptance of the person saved of a baptism of the Spirit, provided by God himself. So long as Nicodemus was thinking of salvation (or the highest good for which he was somehow yearning) in the analogies of earthly things he would find it impossible to reach the truth of the case. Moreover as long as he did this, he would find it impossible to grasp the heavenly nature of salvation.

Verses 14-15. But even heavenly things must in the end be brought down to earth if they are to be appreciated and appropriated by earthly creatures. And if Nicodemus would understand the nature of salvation he must think of it under the figure of the Brazen Serpent in the wilderness. Just as in that instance God provided a means for the healing of those bitten by the fiery serpents, so he has provided for those who are the victims of sin a Savior. And just as a simple look, not by magical means, but because of the faith that prompted it, secured to the victims of the serpent, so a simple trustful look at the uplifted Saviour of men would heal them of sin.

The explanations too mystified and perplexed Nicodemus. And it mystified and perplexed every one who endeavors to solve the problem of salvation by looking to the agency of the serpent, so that God is profoundly and eternally concerned in it. We never can conceive of religion as an effort on man's part to reach God and nothing more, they devise rituals and conformities like the scheme of the Pharisees of old. Whenever they take the word of Jesus for their religion exists, and they are in the heart of man not so much because man is seeking after God, but because man is seeking with man to be made known to him, they will believe that God has provided the Cross in order that a look at the Crucified One may lift man up to God.

Verses 16. The third statement of Jesus to Nicodemus on the supreme subject of conversation between them was that salvation is an expression of God's immeasurable and unfathomable love. It issues from and therefore it returns to God's own life. Salvation is eternal, i. e., a life of fellowship with God through faith in Jesus Christ his Son. It is not mere forgiveness of sin, although it involves the cancellation of past sin and gradual destruction of its power in the future. It is not mere rescue from the punishment of sin in a life to come, but a life of privilege in the life that now is as a beginning of a life that knows no end.

Since salvation was of so much moment to God he signified its coming by sending his only begotten son into the world. He gave the most that he could in order to secure it. "Greater love hath no man than this."

One does not wonder that John 3:16 has become the classical expression of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and is better known to God by a greater number of other verses in the Bible. It tells of the Greatest Giver's Greatest Gift to the greatest number conceivable upon the simplest and most reasonable condition imaginable.


