NEW YORK, Oct. 2—Bob Feller, young Cleveland pitcher, hit the story trail again today in the season's wind-up but this time bowed twice in defeat to Detroit Tigers, 4-1 and 10-8. Feller struck out 18 Tigers in the opener to tie the record for strikeouts in one game—but couldn't pull the game out of the fire. In 1936 Feller fanned 17 Philadelphia Athletics to set an American League record and was then, then with St. Louis Cardinals, his 18th victim today was Chet Laab, who struck out the 15th time in the ninth. He got two more, Greenberg twice, Piet once, Christmas three times and his mound rival, Eisenstat, three times and Fox twice. Feller allowed seven hits, walked seven and hit two.

P.W.C. Squad Show Surprising Form In Turning Back Saint Dunstons 8-5

BY SID FEDER Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—The 1938 big league baseball season, one of the most successful financially in years became history today and only the world series, starting in Chicago Wednesday, stands to be completed here between the Yankees and Cubs, remains. It was a year of sore arms; of booming home runs, featuring Hank Greenberg individually and, as usual, the Yanks as a team, of the most spectacular stretch fight in 30 years for the National League pennant, of Johnny Vander Meer's record job of two straight no-hit, no-run pitching performances. The folks who foot the bill turned out more than 10,000,000 strong through the summer, eclipsing by some 600,000 their '37 mark and perhaps setting a new all time high when all returns are counted. The Yankees, expected to breeze through the American League, had a stiff fight all through the season but they came out before overcoming Cleveland Indians and Boston Red Sox. Chicago Cubs, who clinched the National League flag only yesterday, were counted out a month ago, after Gabby Hartnett had succeeded Charley Grimm as manager. They came back to win 20 of their last 25 games in a stretch fight tighter than any since Fred Merkle's all-time bonehead play lost the crown for the Cubs in 1908.
