Merry Widow, got third position, a summary of a New London race without Merry Widow's "monacher" would be a curiosity.

"Ronaka" a handsome mare imported from New York by Harry Silliphant, Summerside, was unsteady and was much handicapped by the track being soft.

"Mira Wonder" owned by Roy Dann Charlottetown and driven by Dan Steele, Summerside went a good steady race, but couldn't land "in the money."

"Khaki Girl" driven by John Lockhart was off in form on account of a hard race recently. Alycane, owned by Dr. Sullivan, who is at the front, was driven by Dr. Church, Summerside.

The 250 class was decided by four heats, on account of soft ice. "Dingola" a smooth turned three-year-old driven by T. Semple landed first position after dropping the first heat to "Frenchy" and the third to "Troublemaker." "Troublemaker" owned by Robt. Johnston, Kensington landed second position.

"Frenchy" Austin MacNevin's big pacer went a good race. Mr. Neill had a good offer for him after the race.

"Lady Mac" owned by John McKay always was a dangerous competitor, being right with the leaders. "Nellie C." owned by Kier Clark, Kensington, driven by "Happy" Geo. Campbell made a creditable showing for her first race.

"Nettie H" the mother of "Keltie" (2:20) owned by John McKay driven by Bertram Ramsay, at Montrose went a good race, but was rather outclassed.

Patsy H., Della Park and Ruthier went a good race but lacked steadiness and training. Exhibitions were given between heats by Casco A., the fine stallion imported from New York and owned by Mr. Harland. Found, Clifton, and by Happy George owned by Wm. Toombs, Kensington.

WILL FRANCE PART WITH MIQUELON

NEW YORK, March 20.—Associated Press despatch from St. Pierre, Miqu., says the News that there has been active discussion in Newfoundland recently of the possibility that after the war this French Colony might be ceded by France to Great Britain and annexed to Newfoundland. Many of the Colonists think, however, that the change is improbable. They point to the fact that the fisheries operated from the island are very important to France. It is understood that after the war at least a hundred steam trawlers will be sent here from French ports to participate in the fisheries and will need St. Pierre as shore headquarters. The opinion is that for sentimental reasons if for no other France would hesitate to give up her last Colony in this part of the Atlantic Ocean.

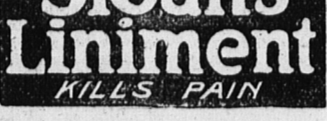
