

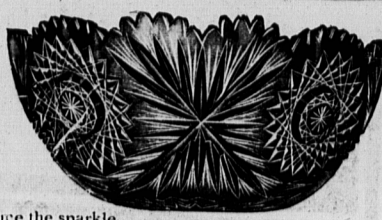

Yesterday morning at ten o'clock the City Council met for the purpose of giving assent to laws and the discount by-law their third reading. This was done and the by-laws were passed.

The valedictory at the Prince of Wales College convocation yesterday was read by Harry Harvey, of Cape Traverse, brother of D. C. Harvey, Rhodes' Scholar. Another brother, Bruce Harvey, also attended the college this year.

At the Prince of Wales College closing yesterday, Prof. J. A. McDonald, M. A., gave an address of farewell. He will leave this summer for Saskatoon to take the position of Professor of French in the University of Saskatchewan.

An eloquent address was given by Mr Powell, of Mount Allison University, while Rev. J. J. Pinkerton, formerly of this province, gave an excellent historical sketch of the league.

Rev Alexander G. McGillivray of Toronto, Past Assistant Supreme Chief Ranger of the Independent Order of Foresters, will spend about a week in this Province this summer. On Sunday, June 12th, he will preach in the Methodist church Summer side at 11 o'clock, in the Presbyterian church at Kensington at 3 o'clock and in Clifton in the evening at 7 o'clock. His other dates will be announced later. Mr McGillivray is one of the ablest public speakers in Canada and no doubt will draw large audiences in the different sections in which he will speak.

The Sackville correspondent to the St John Standard writes:—"Pro'ably no greater progress has been made this year in any of Mt Allison's departments of study than has been evidenced in the theological division. There are this year more ministerial students than the university has ever had before and the progress made in the work has been the greatest in the college's history. Forty students have been enrolled from the various conferences as compared with thirty in 1908-9. First year theologians show a preponderance of Newfoundlanders and Englishmen, with a fine power of thought and application. At the college district meeting held Saturday morning seven students were recommended to be ordained and received into full connection at the ensuing conference meetings.
