

In Southern Alberta.

To laborers, millers, smiths, carpenters and teachers: You could easily lay by two dollars here for every one you could lay by in P. E. I. In view of this why not come west? On excursions you can come from St. John to Calgary for \$35. If you come early in July you will find ranchers and farmers in every hotel there who will give you from \$30 to \$40 per month for two months at haying. At the end of that time if you are dissatisfied with the country your excursion ticket will take you back, so that your two month's labor will not only pay for your trip, but it will give you a fair wage as well. If you are willing to stay and "rough it," you can then obtain work for three months harvesting, thrashing and ploughing, at \$30 per month. About this time people begin to feed their cattle and the ranchers pay laborers \$26 per month until the first of April. If you fail to get work feeding stock you can get one dollar per day in the lumber woods. About the first of April seeding begins and laborers are paid from \$26 to \$30 per month. After seeding you can get about two and a half months' work, driving logs from the woods to the saw-mill, at from \$1.50 to \$2 per day. This completes the year. Should one wish to work by the year on a ranch he can get about \$340 to \$300 per year. Let the laborer invest his earnings in cattle or brood mares, and as feed costs only about \$4 per head for cattle, and nothing at all for horses, your investment would breed a good interest, so that it would not take a great many years for you to acquire a valuable property.

Smart girls that are capable of running a house could easily get from \$15 to \$20 per month and before a year they would probably be running a house of their own.

Wheat is now selling at 60 cents per bushel, flour at \$2.75 per hundred, bran at 90 cents, and shorts at \$1.20, so that millers here under these prices, would receive a toll of about one half. There are several good streams for grist mills but I don't think there is more than one mill in Southern Alberta, it is in Calgary.

In this country blacksmiths receive \$2. for shoeing a horse, his charges for all other work is correspondingly high. Iron costs a little more than in the East. Good sites for skilful smiths are numerous.

There is a good demand for carpenters at \$2.50 per day. Brick-layers receive about \$4 per day.

School teachers receive about \$40 per month, and the demand, especially for female teachers is great, one holding a P. E. Island license can obtain from the Board of Instruction at Regina a permit to teach for one or two years but even before this time expires most females quit teaching to keep house. Before coming West to teach, teachers should obtain this permit and then subscribe for one of the leading territorial papers, such as the Regina Standard which at almost any season of the year contains advertisements asking for teachers. In this way they could engage before leaving their homes.

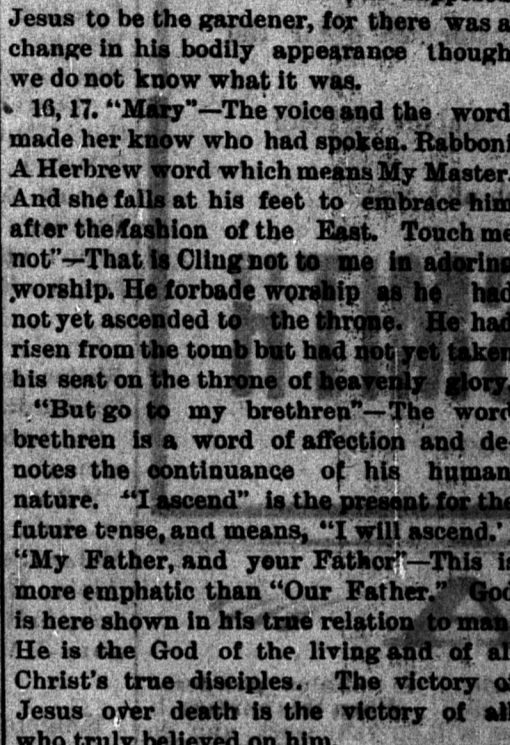

The Discovery of Jesus, v. 14-16. 3. The Proclamation of Jesus, v. 17, 18. Time.—Sunday morning, April 9. A. D. 30. Place.—Near to Golgotha, which has not been identified beyond doubt. LESSON HELPS. 11. Mary had gone out to tell the disciples of the empty sepulchre and then returned. "As she wept"—Half unconscious, her face wet with tears. 12. "And seeth two angels"—A distinct vision to Mary. The angels were in white raiment. White was in Jewish thought a symbol of purity and holiness, and the garment therefore showed the character of the angels. "The one at the head, and the other at the feet"—As the two cherubim sat at the ark of the covenant watching the shekinah. 13. "Woman"—A term of respect. "Why weepest thou"—They walk away, and by the question they opened the way to make her know that she need not weep. "They have taken away my Lord"—She hardly knew who had done so but she spoke in great grief. 15. "Whom seekest thou"—To Mary were spoken the first words of the risen Christ.
