WRESTLING BOUT FATAL

TORONTO, April 7.—Injured in a wrestling match at the West End Y. M. C. A. during the Ontario wrestling championship bouts on March 10 last, William McEwen, aged twenty-six, died tonight of a broken neck.

SOVIET SENT VAST SUMS TO GERMANY

BERLIN, April 9.—The presence here of the soviet delegation to the Genoa conference has been seized upon as the psychological moment for revelations concerning alleged Bolshevik subsidies to the German Communist party. The revelations are made by the Polish Parliamentarian, Nachrichten.

According to a story widely published today the communists received from Russia in 1921 sixty million marks of which about five million marks were for the support of the party organ Rote Fahne.

Moreover it is asserted that the Bolshevik organized at an enormous expense the so called world European secretariat and a vast propaganda work by German Communist publishing houses in Hamburg and Leipzig, and these publishing houses alone in 1921 drew thirty million marks.

It is alleged that the subsidies were formerly in shape of pearls, and other jewels but as these were apt to be lost in transit the latest method of payment has been in the form of dollar bills and other high value currency. It is charged that adequate control of these funds did not exist and that pilferings have been rife.

The Rote Fahne ridicules the revelation as a childish political manoeuvre. It says the German communists have never denied receiving assistance from the Russians. The newspaper makes a veiled accusation that the Majority Socialists electioneering fund has been largely obtained from bourgeois capital.

PLAN TREATY WITH GREAT BRITAIN SOON

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Negotiations of a treaty between the United States and Great Britain with regard to the projected St. Lawrence river waterway plan, was indicated as probable today at the White House. It was said that an agreement whereby the waterway project could be completed was under close study by the administration, and that the belief prevailed already would have to precede any working agreement. It was said that a conflict of opinion had arisen regarding the most speedy way to assure success for the project and that the present study of procedure was aimed to iron out differences on plans of work.

Notable Records Of Production

The Department of Agriculture has just completed one of the best records of production in the Maritime Provinces with its herd of Holstein cows that has been kept during the winter at the Agricultural and Technical School.

The first and best record is that made by Sady Keyes, Abbekerk, a four year old cow. Sady's records are as follows:

1 day, 83 1/2 lbs. milk and 3.86 lbs. butter, 7 days 560 1/2 lbs. milk and 49.56 lbs. butter, 30 days, 2296 1/2 lbs. milk and 103.65 lbs. butter.

Two other records made by two heifers are as follows:

Flossie Deste Keyes, a senior two year old has produced: 1 day 63 3/4 lbs. milk and 2.56 lbs. butter, 7 days 428 lbs. milk and 16.84 lbs. butter, 14 days, 833 lbs. milk and 32.79 lbs. butter, 30 days, 1661 1/2 lbs. milk and 66.82 lbs. butter.

Bertha Deska Keyes, a junior two year old has produced: 1 day 60 lbs. milk and 2.14 lbs. butter, 7 days 408 1/4 lbs. milk and 15.06 lbs. butter, 30 days, 1606 1/2 lbs. milk and 60.5 lbs. butter.

These records are the best that have been recorded for fourteen or thirty days in this Province. The herd has been fed and cared for under the direction of W. J. Reid of the Department of Agriculture and the testing was conducted and vouched for by Fraser T. Morrow, Dairy Instructor for the Province, who was assisted at intervals by Charles J. Cook, Kensington and John Pipey, Mount Herbert.

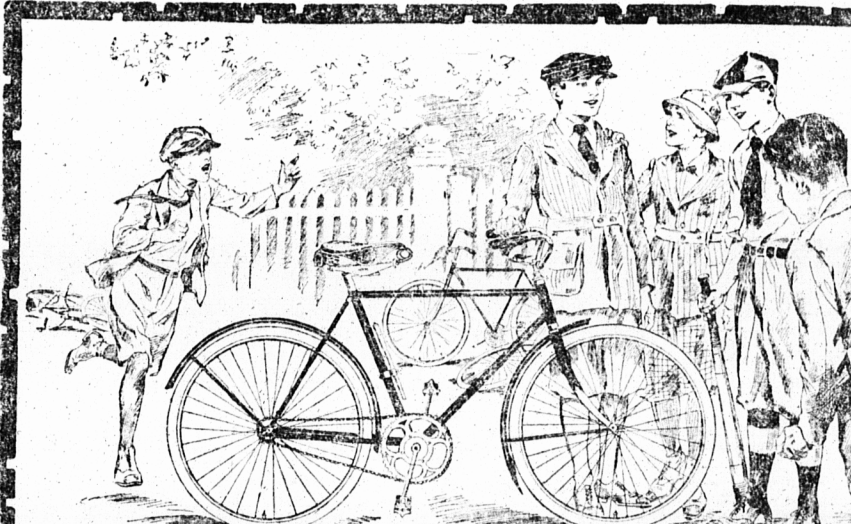
The Quarterly Meeting of the above Board will be held in the Board Room, Market Building, on Wednesday evening next April 12th at 8 o'clock.
