Stars Halt Last Inning Rally By Falcons To Win 7-4

JACK ORR SETS NEW RECORD

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, July 19—A new Canadian record over a mile track was set today as Jack Orr, a free-legged racer owned by G. White, Lexington, Ky., and driven by Tom Berry, Lexington, won the feature event of the second day's racing of the Grand Circuit at Thorncliffe Park.

Jack Orr won the \$3,500 Village Farm Stake, for two-year-olds, sponsored by the Village Farm of Langhorn, Pa., in two straight heats. In the first heat he was out in front at the half-mile mark and reached the wire three lengths ahead of Erle, owned by R. V. Reynolds, of Winston-Salem, N. C., and driven by Spec Erskine, Dayton, Ohio.

In the second heat Jack Orr set all the pace to win by a length. Erle finished second in this heat. The first heat in 2:05 3-4 was a new Canadian record. Gage B. Ellis, owner of the village farm, presented the cup to the winner.

Senator Mimic, owned by J. O'Brien, Cleveland, Ohio, and driven by J. Mahoney, Fremont, Ohio, won the 2:17 Trot, a three-eighths dash affair of three-quarters of a mile, one mile and one and one-sixteenth miles.

After finishing third to Bluebeard in the shorter race Senator Mimic won the other two in easy fashion. He set the pace in the mile dash, and laid off the early pace in the mile and sixteenth to come on and win going away.

High Dress, owned by Mohlenbach brothers, of Fisherville, Ont., and handled by Sy Feathers, won the second and third dashes of the City Club special dashes, 2:17 Pace, Canadian owned. In the three-quarter mile dash she finished 12th, but had no difficulty in winning the second and third heats.

In the classified pace, Sally D. Scott, owned by D. Eugene Fred, of York, Pa., and driven by Doc Parrshall, of Urbana, Ohio, won the three heats, the first two quite handily. In the third heat she was rather lucky as Patrick Potemkin appeared to have the heat within his reach but made a break in the last few paces.

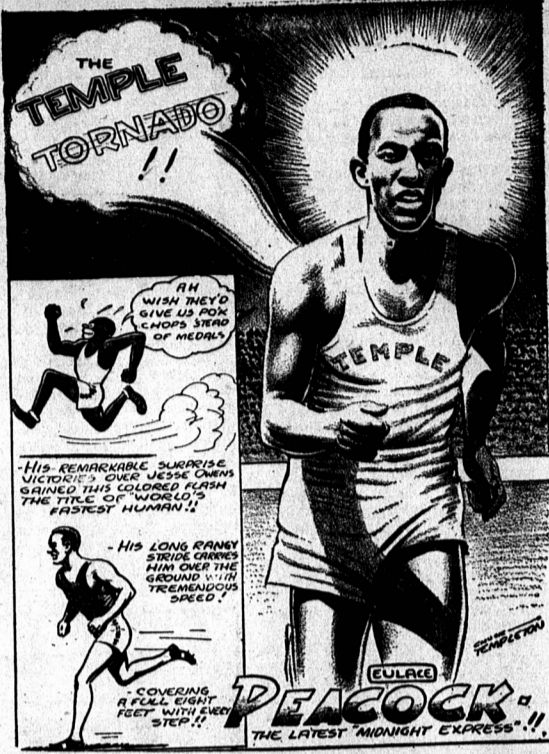

Canadian Sculler Is Big Threat For United States Title

By Bob Cavagnaro, Associated Press Sports Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) PRINCETON, N. J., July 19.—Charlie Campbell, towering Canadian sculler, captured the Association's single championship today, featuring the 63rd United States A. A. O. Regatta, and loomed as a threat to Princeton's regatta national titleholder, Winthrop Rutherford, in tomorrow's United States senior championship race.

Campbell's three-length victory in the good time of 7 minutes, 24.2 seconds over Lake Carnegie's mile-and-a-quarter straightaway qualified the Canadian for the blue-ribbon singles event of the regatta. Campbell, Penn. A. C., 1933 winner, as well as Rutherford in a feature event of the third day's program. Previously Campbell's club mate, Jack Flavette, captured the 145-pound senior single sculls title.

The conquering Canadians, however, were forced to share the honors of the day with the West-Side Rowing Club of Buffalo, whose oarsmen accounted for the national crowns, one of four (with coxswain) being retained for the second year. The Western New Yorkers also annexed the senior four-oared shells (with coxswain) and the intermediate eight-oared championship.

Campbell, rating himself smartly, came from behind in the last quarter mile to beat his keenest rival, Daniel H. Barrow, Jr., of the Penn. A. C. by three lengths. Henry Bugbee of Princeton was third. John F. Coulson, Canadian clubmate of Campbell, caught a crab after passing the half-mile mark. His shell overturned but he was assisted back into the craft and gamely finished the course. Bugbee also had an accident, hitting a course marker, and finished 10 lengths behind Barrow.

Teutons Rely On Von Cramm In Inter-zone Cup Finals

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, July 19.—The United States and German teams were ready tonight for the inter-zone Davis Cup tennis finals, which will determine who earns the right to challenge Britain, defending titleholder, for the cup.

Donald Budge, red-headed California youth and Wilmer Allison, who will bear the brunt of work in the contests, rested today. John Van Ryn of Philadelphia, teamed with Gene Mako of Los Angeles. The Germans, who are depending chiefly on their siege gun, Gottfried Von Cramm, contented themselves with a short workout today.

Two singles encounters are on the first day's program. In the first, Budge meets young Heiner Henkel, weaker member of the German singles duo. Allison faces Von Cramm in the other.

Doubles will be played Monday, with Budge and Allison changing opponents in the two final singles matches Tuesday.

The American players received with undisguised glee news of successive setbacks given Fred Perry, British singles ace, and the British doubles team of S. P. Hughes and C. R. D. Tuckey at Eastbourne yesterday and today.

BREAKS RECORD FOR 440 YARD SWIM

(By Edward J. Neil Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 19.—Two champions fell by the wayside today, but stocky Lenore Kight, best of America's distance swimming young ladies, ploughed steadily along to new triumphs in the United States Women's championships.

Miss Kight, 22-year-old Pennsylvania girl, clipped better than a pond from the standard for 440 yards.

She held staunch and firm as the champion among champions, while the all-England championships, Anne Govendnik of Chisholm, Minn., and Alice Bridgman of Whitinsville, Mass., went down to defeat.

Miss Govendnik wound up in third place as Katherine Rawls, boyish looking youngster from Miami Beach, All-round champion among the women, won her 220-yard breast stroke championship in yard breast stroke considerably back 3:17.1, took second considerably back 3:16.6.

21-year-old New Yorker, Elizabeth Kompka, took Allice Bridges 220-yard back-stroke title away, and the best of the defending champion, could do about it was fourth place, thoroughly beaten. Miss Kompka's winning time was 2:58.9, more than two seconds away from Eleanor Holm Jarrett's record of 2:55.4.

Miss Kight, found a sturdy foe in Mary Lou Petty, a promising youngster from Seattle, Washington, the fastest girl set in the race through England, set the record in fact that she broke the United States record for 220 along the way.

Miss Petty, letting by perhaps two yards, passed the 220-yard mark in two minutes, 37.4 seconds, displacing the distance set by 2:41.3 for that distance set by Miss Ossipowitch, in 1929. She held grimly to her advantage until Miss Kight let out a little more than 100 yards from the finish. Miss Petty faded fast then as the champion straggled in 20 yards in the lead.

Miss Kight's time, 5 minutes, 32.5 seconds, displaced her former record set at 5:33, two years ago.
