

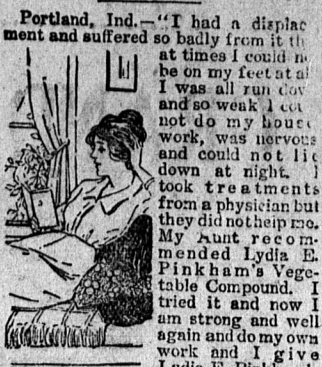

Baptist Home

The first regular meeting of the United Baptist Home Mission Board of the Maritime Provinces met in the First Baptist Church, Moncton, Tuesday, November 4, at 2:30 p. m. Those present were: Rev. F. C. Hartley, Chairman; Rev. E. H. Cochran, Secretary; Rev. E. S. Mason, Treasurer; Samuel Freeman, Esq., Additional member of Executive—Rev. A. L. Huddleston.

The officers for the year are: Chairman—R. B. Wallace, Esq.; Vice Chairman—Rev. F. C. Hartley; Secretary—Rev. E. H. Cochran; Treasurer—Samuel Freeman, Esq.; Additional member of Executive—Rev. A. L. Huddleston.

Rev. F. C. Hartley presented a constitution which was taken up section by section and with some amendments was adopted. Rev. E. S. Mason formerly the efficient superintendent for N. S. and P. E. I. was appointed superintendent for the Maritime Provinces. The report of Rev. J. B. Ganong was received. Deep regret was expressed that owing to illness Mr. Ganong was not able to carry on work as usual. He was appointed as Assistant Superintendent. Rev. and Mrs. L. F. Wallace and Rev. Milton Addison were appointed to continue their engagement as Home Mission Evangelists; Rev. L. J. Lingley to continue as pastor-at-large. R. B. Wallace, E. S. Mason, Samuel Freeman were appointed as an investment committee. It was decided by the Board that for the next month the Superintendent Rev. E. S. Mason should be released from the work of the Board for such time as was found necessary to assist in carrying out the Forward Movement.

Grants amounting to \$5,000 were made to Home Mission churches principally in N. S. and P. E. I. The grants for the N. B. Churches had already been made.

The Secretary was asked to send a letter to the family of the late Rev. Josiah Webb conveying the sympathy of the Board to them in their bereavement. A letter was also sent to Rev. J. G. A. Belyea sympathizing with him in his recent illness. It was advised that a council be called to examine for ordination Mr. Montgomery of the N. S. African Association. The cases of three men who wished to work on Home Mission fields were considered.

The United Board has undertaken a large and important department of our denominational work in the provinces. In spite of the serious lack of men the field never looked brighter than at the present and it was gratifying to notice the statesmanlike manner in which the Board faced the problems.

As far as it was possible they endeavoured to raise the salaries of all the Missionaries to \$1200 and a free house. After two full sessions the meeting adjourned Tuesday evening to meet again in regular session at 2 p. m. the first Tuesday of April at the first Baptist Church, Amherst.

The proceeds of the Loan will be used to pay indebtedness incurred, and to meet expenditures to be made in connection with demobilization (including the authorized war service gratuity to our soldiers, land settlement loans, and other purposes connected with their re-establishment into civil life), for capital outlay upon shipbuilding, and other national undertakings forming part of Canada's industrial reconstruction programme, and for the establishment of any necessary credits for the purchase of grain, foodstuffs, timber and other products, and will be spent wholly in Canada.

Payment to be made as follows:
10% on application; 20% January 9th, 1920;
20% December 9th, 1919; 20% February 10th, 1920;
31.21% March 9th, 1920.

The last payment of 31.21% covers 30% balance of principal and 1.21% representing accrued interest at 5 1/2% from November 1st to due dates of the respective instalments.

Denomination and Registration

Bearer bonds, with coupons, will be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, and \$1,000, and may be registered as to principal. The first coupon attached to these bonds will be due on May 1st, 1920.
Fully registered bonds, the interest on which is paid direct to the owner by Government cheque, will be issued in denominations of \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000, \$10,000, \$25,000, \$50,000, \$100,000, or any multiple of \$100,000.

Payment of Interest

A full half-year's interest at the rate of 5 1/2% per annum will be paid May 1st, 1920.
Form of Bond and Delivery
Subscribers must indicate on their applications the form of bond and the denominations required, and the securities so indicated will be delivered by the bank upon payment of subscriptions in full.
Bearer bonds of this issue will be available for delivery at the time of application to subscribers desirous of making payment in full. Bonds registered as to principal only, or fully registered as to principal and interest, will be delivered to subscribers making payment in full, as soon as the required registration can be made.
Payment of all instalments must be made at the bank originally named by the subscriber.
Non-negotiable receipts will be furnished to all subscribers who desire to pay by instalments. These receipts will be exchangeable at subscriber's bank for bonds on any instalment date when subscription is paid in full. All receipts must be exchanged before 1st June, 1920.

The mayor was then called on and there was loud laughter as he defended himself for being late, saying, "Don't you blame me," he said.
