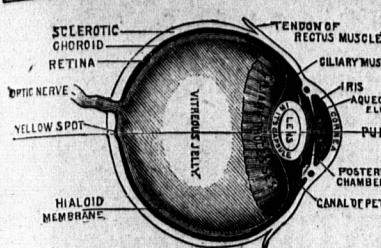

ST. JOHN TELEGRAPH.—The resigna-tions of John Russell, Jr., president of The Telegraph and Times Publishing Companies, with E. W. McCreedy and A. M. Belding, editors of The Telegraph and The Times respectively, which were placed in David Russell's hands as a result of Mayor White's attitude during the strike crisis, have not been accepted, and these gentle-men will continue as before. David Russell feels that as the strike has been settled most satisfactory so far as it affects the port of St. John, and as this was the main issue, the question of Mayor White's resignation may well be left in the hands of the citizens.

BRIGADIER HOWELL, Toronto, chief emigration agent of the Salvation Army in Canada, is favoring Charlottetown with a visit, and will conduct meetings at the Barracks here Saturday evening and all day Sunday. The Brigadier is well known here, having in earlier days been known as the Welsh Minstrel, be-cause of his fine musical talent. His marked executive abilities have led to his steady promotion to his present responsible position in which during the past year he has arranged and carried out the transportation and successful placing in Canada of over 5000 emigrants from Great Britain. The public is invited to the meetings Saturday and Sunday. An effort is being made to have Brigadier Howell remain over and lecture Mon-day evening on the emigration work of the Salvation Army which is now at-tracting world-wide attention.

The home of A. B. and Mrs. Carter, Revere, Mass. was the scene of a very pretty wedding on Thanksgiving eve. The contracting parties were Miss Alice Maude, youngest daughter of Richard and Mrs. Ellsworth of Waterford, Lot 1, and W. W. Cormier, Souris. P. E. I. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father Barry of Revere at 7.30 p. m. The bride-maid was Miss Katie Noonan, Palmer Road and the groom was supported by Peter McIsaac. The bride was very prettily attired in a dress of pearl mus-ling trimmed with white silk and pale pink and carried a beautiful bouquet of white bridal roses and pinks. After the ceremony together with their many friends, they went to the home of the bride's sister Mrs. Carter where a very in-teresting supper was laid amidst profusion of the most fragrant flowers. When the inner man was catered to, the assembled guests enjoyed a very pleasant evening with music, singing and dancing. The presents were numerous and costly show-ing the esteem and good wishes of their many friends. The Guardian joins in wishing the happy couple all happiness and prospects in their married life.

The vote of the Waterloo, Brussels and Leinster street Baptist churches will be taken tonight at their meetings relative to the question of reorganization. The scheme is to use the Leinster street plant and do away with the other two build-ings. It is understood that there will be no opposition in Leinster street to the idea. In the congregation of Waterloo street church there is reported some feel-ing that as the debt on their building is small and as hitherto they have had no difficulty in getting along it would be undesirable to make any change. There is also reported to be a section of Brussels street congregation who feel that the proposal to take away two churches from that section of the city is too radical, and they say that if the question was to do away with one church they would see their way clear to support it. At the same time a considerable number from both these churches feel that reorganiza-tion of some kind is desirable. It is also pointed out that the Leinster street plant is the most valuable of the three. It is a solidly built brick building with ground enough to allow of extension. Then it is also pointed out that there would be a large saving of money, probably \$2,000 or \$2,500 a year, at least.—St. John Tele-graph.
