Ottawa Turns Attention To Unemployment

OTTAWA, July 14 (CP)—After weeks of work on war problems and special war legislation Parliament turns its attention this week to an unemployment insurance law, a long-range social measure designed more particularly for the peace which, it is hoped, will follow victory.

With war industry and military, naval and air enlistment leading more and more men, Canada is just now approaching the point where governments can see the prospect of an end to the unemployment conditions which prevailed since 1921 and which necessitated large expenditures by federal, provincial and municipal governments on relief and special works for the provision of jobs.

Under the law all persons employed in occupations designated in the bill will start to build up reserves in the unemployment insurance fund against the time when they may be out of work. The government itself will contribute to the fund as well as exact contributions from employers and employees.

Earlier in the week Hon. W. P. Munnick was installed as Postmaster General. James Iley as Provincial Minister, and Hon. Colin Gibson as Minister of National Revenue, succeeding Mr. Lisle.

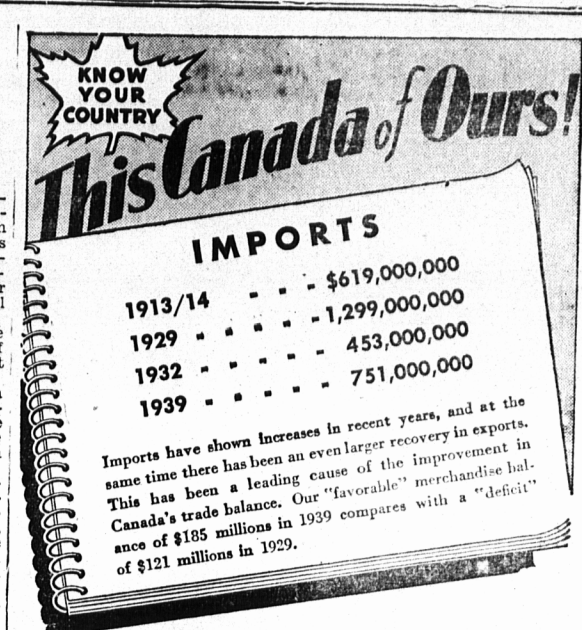

CLEVELAND, July 14.—(AP)—The peak of the current movement in steel prices apparently has not yet been reached, the magazine "Steel" asserted today, with gains continuing in July despite the recent holiday interruptions.
