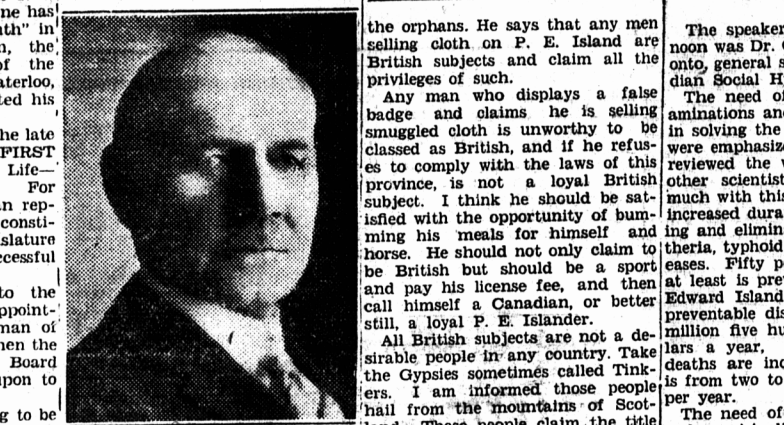

The speaker at Rotary yesterday noon was Dr. Gordon Bates, of Toronto, general secretary of the Canadian Social Hygiene Council.

The need of periodic health examinations and of community effort in solving the problems of health were emphasized by the speaker.

The retiring President, Dr. MacMillan, presided at yesterday's meeting, and in introducing the speaker spoke of what the Provincial Government is doing to assist public health, the grants having increased from three thousand to sixteen thousand dollars.

After the address he said that the matter of appointing a committee to the Rotary, as Dr. Bates suggested, would be taken up later.
