EDITORIAL NOTES.

Yesterday the civic elections were to come off in Moncton, the peculiarity being that there were straight Liberal and Conservative tickets nominated for Mayor and Councillors. Mr. John T. Hawke editor and proprietor of the Moncton Transcript was the Liberal Candidate and Fred. W. Sumner, ex-M. P. P. the Conservative candidate. It was expected that every available vote would be polled in the Railway Town yesterday.

Petrusburg, reported yesterday as having been occupied by General Tucker on Sunday, is situated on the main highway leading due east from Jacobsdal to Bloemfontein and is approximately midway between those two points. Petrusburg is about 47 miles from Bloemfontein. Driefontein, where the severe fighting took place on the same day, and the Boers were driven from their entrenched positions with heavy loss, is not marked upon our maps, but must be located some miles to the north-eastward of Petrusburg. Asvogel, since occupied by the British, is only 25 miles from Bloemfontein.

THE GUARDIAN has been asked to state whether Lord Dundonald, who led the relief column into Ladysmith, is Scotch or Irish. He is undoubtedly Scotch. In the peerage there is no other Lord Dundonald than the Scottish Earl who bears that title. The Earldom was founded in 1669. The present Earl Dundonald was born in 1852 and succeeded to the title in 1885. The family name is Cochrane. His full name is Douglas M. B. H. Cochrane, C. B. Earl of Dundonald. His eldest son, Lord Cochrane, was born in 1886. Lord Dundonald is also one of the sixteen Scottish Representative Peers who sit in the House of Lords as representatives of the Kingdom of Scotland during this term of Parliament. The authority for above stated facts is Whitaker's Peerage.

Lord Roberts has addressed a warning to Presidents Kruger and Steyn in regard to the abuse of the white flag and the use of explosive bullets. In this he states that the abuse of the white flag and holding up of hands in token of surrender, immediately followed by firing upon and wounding British officers and soldiers was witnessed by himself. He also tells that a large number of explosive bullets were found in Cronje's laager, and after every engagement with the Boer troops. Lord Roberts warns the Dutch Presidents that such conduct, a disgrace to any civilized power, will if repeated hereafter compel him reluctantly to order his troops to disregard the white flag entirely. Boer piety of which we have heard so much, seems to be accompanied by a treachery which can best be described as devilish.

The death is announced of the Hon. James D. Lewin of St. John, one of the Senators for New Brunswick, at the advanced age of 87 years. Mr. Lewin was born in Wales and educated there. In early life he entered the British civil service and in that capacity came to New Brunswick in 1830. For twenty years he continued in that capacity, and when the department with which he was connected was abolished in 1856 he was elected President of the Bank of New Brunswick, in which position he became the most eminent banker in the Province of New Brunswick. He retained the Presidency until recent years. Mr. Lewin was always held in the highest regard by the business community. He was appointed to the Senate by the Mackenzie Government in 1876.

THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING

A Short Session—Council Attends the Presentation in Drill Shed.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held in the Council Chamber last night. Present His worship Mayor Warburton, Recorder Haszard and Couns. Whear, McDonald, Tanton, Horne, Balls, Taylor and Brown.

A number of bills were read and passed. The city school estimates for 1900 were submitted.

A communication was read from a number of printers and bookbinders asking the Council to prohibit persons not residents of the province soliciting orders or making an agreement to supply any kind of printing to the consumer without first having obtained a license from the City Clerk.

Coun. Whear moved that the petition be referred to a special committee to confer with the Recorder and prepare a bill to be presented at the

next session of the Legislature giving authority to the Council to pass the Bye Law. After some discussion the motion was carried.

The Mayor requested the City Clerk to read the communication received from Mr. W. S. Stewart by the City Council some time ago, in which Miss Higgins claimed damages.

Coun. Taylor thought there was no doubt about the defective sidewalk, but he would like to hear the Recorder's opinion on the matter. After some discussion it was referred to the street committee.

Before the Council adjourned his Worship said that he hoped to see all the Councillors present at the Drill Shed at 9 o'clock.

Council adjourned.

Grant, Summerside; W. H. Warren, Bedeque; Rev. D. Price, Tryon; E. A. McPhee, East Point; F. P. Dresser, (Lic) Tyne Valley; G. P. Raymond, City. The church was filled with a large audience which had come together to hear more of the various features of the Missionary work which the Baptist churches of the Maritime provinces are doing. In the absence of the chairman of the Conference, Rev. A. C. Shaw of Annandale, the meeting was presided over by Rev. E. J. Grant. After the devotional exercises Rev. E. J. Grant gave an address, subject: "Our Weaker Churches" and how to strengthen them. At the conclusion of the address, Rev. W. H. Warren, of Bedeque spoke endorsing the words of the former speaker. Rev. G. P. Raymond followed, subject: "In the Missionary Work Succeeding,"
