REPORT OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY, Y. M. C. A. FOR THE MONTH OF MARCH, 1934

To the President and Members of the Board of Directors, Gentlemen,—
March was a very busy month; with the closing of the skating season our building was well filled at all hours.

The regular program and many special events were all carried off successfully.

The Building.

There is nothing new to report. The building is standing up to the many activities, as well as could be expected. The plaster in some parts has broken away in the ceiling, owing (no doubt) to the numerous basketball games, but otherwise the building is in fair shape.

Student Work.

Five regular Saturday night meetings were held in March with the regular attendance of 100 to 150. The report of the Physical Department covers the activities of this group more fully.

Sunday Evening Services.

Five splendid services were conducted this month, with an average attendance of 340 per Sunday.

On March 2nd Mr. J. H. Geldart of Toronto, gave us an illustrated lecture on the Foreign Work of our Association.

March 9th,—our service was held in the Baptist Church, and the speaker was Dr. Vincent. On the 16th, Rev. Fred Wilkinson of Toronto was the speaker, and his message was indeed an inspiring one.

On March 23rd our service was held in St. James Church. This was an exceptionally fine service and we were privileged to have Miss Elsie McLuhan, noted elocutionist of Winnipeg, as our speaker. St. James choir rendered three fine numbers. Four hundred people attended.

Mr. J. H. Crocker, National Director of Physical Education, was our special speaker on March 30th. 1700 people attended these services during the month.

Sunday Morning Meetings.

We have re-opened our Sunday morning Bible Class for boys, having had two meetings in March. We expect to carry these on until May or June.

Boys' Work.

The special feature of our Boys' Work this month was the Annual Father and Son Banquet, held on March 13th, with over one hundred boys and dads in attendance. Mr. J. H. Geldart was the special speaker for this event.

The program of music and speeches and games carried off successfully. It is upon occasions of this nature that it is possible to get many fathers into the Y. M. C. A., thus giving us the opportunity of becoming better acquainted with them.

Visitors.

The annual visits of Mr. J. H. Geldart and Mr. J. H. Crocker of the National Council, on March 1st, 3rd and 29th to 1st respectively, did much to stimulate our program. The many meetings, especially the two illustrated lectures, were well attended and our work in general was given a real boost.

Your Staff had a very fine and helpful time with these senior officers, who were able to pass on to us a brief summary of the work going on all over Canada.

Y's Men's Club.

This club as usual met each Thursday night at six, for supper and meeting, then adjourning to the bowling alleys and gymnasium for bowling, volleyball.

On March 24th, the Elsie McLuhan Dramatic Recital (under the auspices of this Club) came off very successfully, over 300 people being present.

Our Club deserves great praise for bringing a talented artist such as Miss McLuhan to Charlottetown. It is hoped and expected that she will return again next year.

WHO ARE YOU?

A Coolidge?

The Romance of Your Name

Coolidge

This surname is of English origin and even in England it is rare, being confined almost entirely to Cambridge, the ancestral home of the family.

The name was spelled many ways as is found by examining the records of different documents. There are wills recorded, in 1518 by William Culling, 1538, Margaret Cullage, 1551 Thomas Cullage, and 1616 another Thomas Cullage all of them of Cambridge-shire. In 1596, is found the will of Nicholas Coolidge, in which he mentions the names of William Lilly, John Alexander and Martin and Danyell Coolidge.

It is believed that John Coolidge, who settled in Watertown, Mass., about 1630, is the ancestor of the Coolidge in America. He was, at any rate, the founder of the New England family of the name. John Coolidge was baptized in 1604 at Cottingham, Cambridgeshire, England, the son of William and Margaret Coolidge.

John Coolidge took an active interest in the New England Colony and became a freeman in 1636, selectman in 1639, and in 1658, was appointed a delegate to the General Court. He married Mary Wellington Madock. The descendants of John were prominent in affairs both civic and military. His son, John, served as an officer in King Philip's War and later descendants have distinguished themselves in high offices.

There are Coolidges in many States today but most of them are traceable.

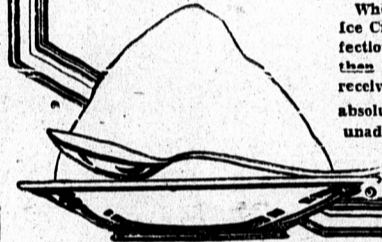
